

"Turn to me and be gracious to me, for I am lonely and afflicted." (Psalm 25:16)

Dear friends in Christ,

Grace and peace to you from God our Father, and our Lord, Jesus Christ.

According to a 2018 survey of more than 20,000 U.S. adults, nearly half (46 percent) report experiencing times of loneliness. Surprisingly, the survey found that young adults (ages 18-22) were the most vulnerable and that heavy use of social media did not noticeably lessen the extent of loneliness. Now, in this time of social distancing, loneliness is an even greater health and well-being concern.

The Bible has many examples of loneliness other than David's lament seen above. Many of God's prophets were estranged from their communities as they answered God's call. Even Jesus, betrayed, abandoned, and dying on the cross, cries out, "My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?" I find it reassuring to know that we have a God who not only knows our weaknesses but has experienced our temptations and troubles.

If you are experiencing loneliness, the first practical step is to realize you are not alone. Whether it is classmates, family members, or people in your community, others have experienced loneliness and know what you are going through. One of the suggestions that professionals give in combating loneliness is simply to take care of your physical self by eating healthy, exercising, and getting enough sleep. Another is to build a support network of family and friends. Unfortunately, for many of us, a huge part of our support group was our weekly time of worship and fellowship. Still, we might ask ourselves not only where can I find support but who might I reach out to that needs my word of encouragement? Often it is in the act of giving that we receive.

Finally, the one suggestion that intrigued me the most, especially during this time of social distancing, came from a website called lifeandhealth.org. They noted that being alone does not equal loneliness and often we may just need to change our perspective. Jesus often found it necessary to get away from the crowd to spend time with God and gain a new perspective. Time alone is also a useful time to sharpen a talent or learn a new skill.

Many pastors, including myself, are having to learn the new skills for ministering and ministry, like creating an online worship experience. For you, this may be the perfect time to take up crafting, learn a musical instrument, or learn to make bread from scratch. You might rediscover the wonders of nature as you take time to watch a bird build a nest, watch the sandhill cranes do their mating dance, or listen to the spring peepers. Maybe you will find the time to view a spectacular sunset or watch as a full moon breaks over the horizon. Perhaps you will discover a new book, reread a beloved book, or have a long phone conversation with a friend.

And last, but certainly not least, perhaps you will find time to read a word of scripture and sit and reflect in **the quiet stillness of God's presence, knowing that God who watches over the sparrow, will certainly watch over you** (Matt. 10:29-31).

Bible Campers

Crossways Camping Ministries has three camps in Wisconsin: Pine Lake in Waupaca, Imago Dei Village in Clintonville, and Way Post in Hatley. Our youth from St. Mark’s usually attend Pine Lake in Waupaca. They are able to attend any one of the three. Crossways Mission Statement is: *Bringing People together in Christ so lives are changed and Communities enhanced.*

I got a chance to ask some of the kids what they do at camp and it is a good thing I can write fast because they were full of answers. When they first get there, each cabin performs a skit to introduce themselves to the rest of their cabin. There are camp fire sing-alongs, arts and crafts, camp games such as kickball, Capture the Flag, Hunger Games, Nine Squares in the Air, and Gaga ball.

After breakfast each day they attend church in the chapel and go swimming. They have a raft the kids can swim out to as long as they passed a swimming test. Each cabin during the week gets to set up, serve and clean up for one of the meals. They get to make homemade pretzels as well. The youth cooks hotdogs over a campfire and make s’mores. They have a canteen where there are snacks, clothing items, water bottles, etc. to purchase. They have daily Bible studies and learn how much God is a part of their everyday lives.

The older youth have a one-night camp sleepout. They do a service project in the Waupaca area, go on nature walks, go biking, and participate in archery, basketball and canoeing. Last year they built a 10-foot-high wood cross that was placed to the right of Evergreen Cabin.

On their last day, parents are able to join their youth for lunch and watch the closing ceremony in the chapel. During the ceremony, each cabin puts on a skit, sings a song, and reads a poem of their choice.

Some of our youth are hesitant about going to camp at first, but by the end of the week they don't want to leave! Many develop lasting friendships over their time there. It is so nice to see these kids come home so pumped and feeling more comfortable talking about their awesome God and singing songs they learned while there.

Our youth have been very fortunate to benefit from St. Mark’s fundraising efforts through pizza sales, Vande Walle’s candy bars, our annual basket raffle and Easter breakfast, to name a few. Due to the funds our faith members have provided through these fundraising opportunities/events, our Bible campers have been able to attend camp for free. We do ask the youth to help out at these fundraisers. We want every youth to be able to attend camp that would like to. There has been a couple of times that we needed to ask the Endowment Fund Committee to help us out. We are very grateful they were able to.

Crossways offers other programs as well. They have a Confirmation Camp that has a whole new set of fun activities and adventures geared specially for youth. Crossways Camp is not only for our youth. Several different types of retreats are offered, including family week, couples weekend, grandparents camping, a program for Autistic campers, and women's weekends, just to name a few. Come check out all that Crossways has to offer.



Thank You Cards – There were no special Thank You's sent out this month.

At this time we let our two guests, Joe Deckers and Rich Sczerzen, address the council. KC has most graciously offered us enough carpet squares to redo our Fellowship Hall. Joe has received a bid for \$3,500 to \$4,000 to dispose of the old carpet, fill and smooth out any cracks, remove any old glue and install the squares. Due to the COVID-19 Virus they have had cancellations and are able to move our project up. Due to our church being closed because to the COVID-19 Pandemic, this would be a good time for them to be able to do the carpeting with the least amount of disturbing any other normally planned events. They are expecting to have it all done in 2 to 3 days.

4. Giving needs to be around \$3,500.00 to \$4,000.00 per Sunday to meet spending.



Christian Education:

1. Senior Game Day has been scheduled on Ash Wednesday, Wed, Feb. 26th, 2020 from 2 – 5 P.M. A light meal will follow games before the Ash Wednesday Service. A signup sheet will be posted at church and at St. Mark's Apartments. Bingo and Bunko along with some other games will be offered. We will have prizes for the winners.

Endowment: No Report.

Finance/Stewardship:

1. Reviewed the end of the month account balances. February giving was \$12,567.09 and expenses were \$15,629.06. Our spending was over our giving by \$3,061.97. Council reviewed the expenditures and it should be noted that snow removal was higher than originally budgeted for, storm water tax, fire protection tax, water/sewer quarterly payments were paid, and the yearly benevolence to Appleton Conference was contributed.

* \$1,200.00 {\$100 to each of the {12} Mission of the Month Ballot that **did** get picked {Bible Campers, Food Pantry, South African Partnership, Wed. Quilting Group, Christine Ann Center, Community Table, Esther, Homeless Connections, Bunk Beds for Guatemala, ELCA Disaster Response, ELCA World Hunger, and International Children's Fund}

* \$800.00 to the following {4} mission places {Food for the Poor, Pine Ridge Indian Reservation, Bethel, Alaska Mission Trip and Haiti Produce Good Fruits}

* \$9,581.20 remains undesignated. Available for upcoming needs.

Special Council Meeting

April 2, 2020

Present: Eric Blank, Sharyn Gawlick, Bruce Grundman, Mary Jane Hartley, Judy Hellman, Laurie Olson, Donna Joachim, Pennie Linna, Nancy Rose, Phyllis Ziemke and Pastor Bob.

Excused: Jeff Tharp.

This Special Council Meeting was called to order by President Laurie Olson @ 6:38 P.M.

Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, Governor Evers has put in place an order of social distancing. To comply with these guidelines and keep everyone safe, Eric Blank, Bruce Grundman, Mary Jane Hartley, Laurie Olson, Pennie Linna, Nancy Rose, Donna Joachim, and Pastor Bob met online through the Zoom app. Sharyn Gawlick, Judy Hellman, and Phyllis Ziemke joined us through a phone conference call.

Pastor Bob led us in prayer with a reading from The Sermon on the Mount and the Serenity Prayer.



Due to the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic we needed to make the following decisions for St. Mark's Church:

- 1. Present church services:** Following some discussions **MSC by Phyllis Ziemke/Sharyn Gawlick** for all church services to remain cancelled until further notice. The church service will remain available in a shortened version on Sunday Morning through the website or on Facebook.
- 2. Building Use:** **MSC by Bruce Grundman/Judy Hellman** for the building to remain closed. There will be no outside groups meeting. The Food Pantry will reopen and continue to serve people as long as it can be safely done for everyone involved.
- 3.** Church office will be open during regular hours, but the doors will be locked. A sign will be posted on the door stating the building is closed and that if anyone needs assistance, they should contact the church office at 725-2828.
- 4.** Pastor has been connecting with the Synod and other colleagues on Tuesday and Thursdays through the Zoom App. The Synod is recommending that no funerals be conducted at this time either at the church or at the funeral homes. After some discussion **MSC by Phyllis Ziemke/Judy Hellman** to follow the guidelines set down by the Synod.
- 5.** At one time there was some discussion about offering a drive-up type of Communion, possibly on Easter Morning. Everything is all contained in its own individual wrapped container. After discussing this further it just is not worth the possible risk of spreading this virus more or people dying from it.
- 6.** Pastor and a few others are working on trying to set up where people can call in and be able to listen to the church service Easter Morning. Pennie Linna has offered to burn some DVD's and mail them out to our members.

7. The Fellowship Hall is ready to have the carpet squares be placed down. With the COVID-19 pandemic going on, so many places are closed. We will need to figure some way to get the carpet squares picked up from the KC Warehouse when it can be safely done.

Motion to adjourn by Pennie Linna/Mary Jane Hartley @ 7:27 P.M. We closed with the Lord's Prayer.
