Dear friends in Christ,

One year ago, this month, St. Mark's Church like many others in our community, made the difficult decision to close our doors to in-person worship services because COVID-19 was beginning to spread in our area. We had just begun the church season of Lent, and we were unsure whether we would be able to safely worship together on Easter Sunday, or really, anytime soon.

However, we quickly learned to adapt to our new reality, and soon we were worshipping together as a virtual faith community. Other St. Mark's members without access to the internet were soon receiving DVD recordings of the worship service. St. Mark's Education Committee began providing materials for parents to help their children learn about God's love for them safely from home. Parent teaching their children about Jesus in the home. Now, there is a great concept worth continuing in some manner!

Over the past year, some of our members have battled the coronavirus, and thankfully survived. Many others have managed to avoid the virus and are now receiving the vaccine which should provide some protection. However, because this virus continues to mutate into new strains, the experts tell us we will need to remain vigilant and continue to follow all the safety guidelines to keep ourselves and others safe, for the foreseeable future.

It is with the health expert's word of caution in mind, and with many safeguards in place that St. Mark's

Church council has decided to return to in-person worship. Unfortunately, it will be some time before we return to worship and fellowship in the way that we were accustomed.

I want to thank everyone of you for your patience over these past many months. This has not been an easy time for any of us. Thankfully, this virus has not taken the lives of any of our members, and with sustained due diligence we will continue to keep ourselves, each other, and our community safe, even as we return to in-person worship.

# Pastor's Report

- 1. I have made numerous phone calls to members over the holidays, as home visits are limited due to Covid. All hospital visits still continue to be suspended due to the COVID-19.
- 2. I continued to post Tuesday morning devotional on St. Mark's Facebook page.
- 3. I participated in several Zoom Meetings with the Synod Office and pastoral colleagues regarding best practices during the coronavirus.
- 4. I continue to offer weekly confirmation classes on Wednesday evening for St. Mark's 6th, 7th, and 8th grade students on line.
- 5. I continue to work with my wife, Laurie, in assembling worship videos to upload to St. Mark's Facebook page and to record to DVD's, this includes special worship service videos for Christmas Eve and Christmas Day.
- 6. I presided at our January parking lot worship service with Holy Communion.



- 7. I participated in an online continuing education class on Anti-Racism offered by the East Central Synod of Wisconsin.
- 8. I met with our church musicians and others to record worship music for St. Mark's on-line worship video.
- 9. I continue to meet with St. Mark's Committees as needed or by request.
- 10. I met with St. Mark's Reopening Task Force to make plans for and assess the risk of reopening our building for in-person worship.
- 11. I had several on-line meeting with church members and church leaders in the community.
- 12. Heather Konietzki has offered to help out with Confirmation Classes.
- 13. I am planning on taking vacation January 25 31. Pastor Karen Ressel will be our guest preacher on Sunday, January 31st.

  - Let Mary Jane know that we will keep our budget the same: \$2,300.
  - We have spent more this year, but I am spending more on getting items for the kids and the cost of postage to send out material, plus what is needed for the Christmas bags and food activities.
  - Donna spent \$1,025 for Good Gifts. We purchased chickens, roosters, a fish farm, goats, piglets, honeybees, water filters,

school supplies, solar-powered lanterns, seeds and gardening tools, fruit trees, stocked a health clinic for a week, got nutrition for 2 children for a month, vaccinations for 2 children, blankets, stocked a backpack for 2 children, and funded 20 people to eat at a soup kitchen. What a great way to show we can help other people.

### Finance/Stewardship:

- 1. Laurie reviewed the current giving amount which was \$20,899.18 and expenditures were \$14,988.58. Our spending was under our giving by \$5,910.60
- 2. Laurie had us review the reports and we observed from items that needed to be corrected or addressed. We have a negative amount in the Technology amount in Associated Bank. We also have \$2,231.38 in the savings account that could be moved over to the designated account in Associated Bank to bring that account to positive. We also have Technology costs with the new camera and components to make that functional that the committee might be something that Memorial money that is not designated could be used to cover the cost.
- 3. We also noted that one of the organizations that we were going to give \$200 dollars to was unavailable to receive the amount. The board agreed to have the money go to Ally Jansen to assist in helping her family cover the cost of her cancer treatment. That money should have been sent out but it is still showing up on the books.
- 4. We then reviewed the proposed budget for next year. We recommend a raise to for Pastor. In addition, to assist Pastor with utilizing tax benefits to Pastors, we moved some of his salary to be recorded under housing rather in just general salary. His insurance also went up this year.
- 5. We recommend our secretary get a raise as well. The current salary is \$12,485.00 and the increase would bring the salary to \$12,560.00. That is a \$75 increase for the year.
- 6. We also increased the general cost for Organist/Musicians from \$8,500 to \$8.700 for this year.
- 7. In reviewing the Benevolences it was noted that we had promised to pay the Synod \$8,750 last year however that never got added to the budget sheet and therefore Mary Jane only paid them \$7,150. We currently have not met our promise. We are short by \$1,600. We feel that we need to honor our agreement and pay that amount out of last year's budget. The committee also would to recommend that this year's agreement with the Synod should be \$8,750.

# Social Ministry:

- 1. The Food Pantry is still doing a brisk business every Wednesday morning. We keep getting a few new people every Wednesday, but most are our regulars. Some come every week, but most only come once or twice a month.
- 2. In December we had 22: people come in needing help, but last year, we were able to help almost 1,000 people. We wouldn't be able to help them without your support of money and goods. We are always in need of paper products, tuna, spam, juice, peanut butter and jam.

## Worship and Music:

- 1. The Christmas Eve Service was well received. The children's program and family Christmas greetings were lovely. About 46 participated in the drive-thru communion between 3:00-4:00 pm on Christmas Eve.
- 2. Another parking lot service will be on January 16 at 9:00 am.
- 3. Several series for Lent were discussed. Pastor Bob will make the final choice on which series to use. Ash Wednesday is on February 17, which starts the Lenten season.
- 4. It was decided to keep the same budget for the upcoming year.

#### Unfinished Business:

#### New Business:

- 1. Any building use is on hold until further notice. The Covid numbers need to go way down. Maybe once the camera is installed and we can mainstream into the Fellowship Hall, we will re-examine this.
- 2. In light of the COVID-19 Pandemic the following decisions have been put in place for the paid staff and St. Mark's church. This will be revisited monthly or sooner if needed.
  - \* Judy, Delores and LuAnn our Organists will continue to be paid thru the end of February. MSC by Phyllis Ziemke/Nancy Rose. {Judy Hellman Abstaining.}
  - \* Janitors position has been posted. Notice is posted on Facebook and in the Newsletter.
  - \* All outside groups that meet at St. Mark's remain cancelled till further notice. {Will re-examine this when we see how the in-service re-opening goes.}
  - \* Regular Church services for St. Marks is available on Facebook Live.
  - \* Church office at the present will remain open in the morning.
  - \* Food Pantry program to continue, following safety guidelines.

All of the above decisions will continue to be monitored on a regular basis as we continue to work our way thru this health crisis facing our country

- 3. Pastor Bob and Laurie Olson gave an update on the camera system: Our installer is waiting for a couple of components to come in and the hope is to have the job completed soon. Once the camera is operating, we will be able to livestream the service on Facebook, burn DVDs to distribute the service using a USB port project service on screen in fellowship hall, and allow worshipers to sit in their cars and listen to the service (similar to the parking lot worship using the transmitter). Jason and Bruce ran the cables from office to sacristy and sacristy to fellowship hall. With that system, a reservation sign-up will not be necessary. Three of the Neenah ELCA churches are back to in-person worship services.
- 4. Council decided to consider in-person worship, once the camera is installed. Tentatively looking at returning to in-person in early February.
- 5. There will be no singing during worship or fellowship after church.
- 6. The back door will remain locked. A sign at the end of the bathroom hallway will be placed asking people not to enter the area.
- 7. Suggested that special music be played, using prerecorded singing (similar to what is used on the Facebook recorded services). There will be no hymnals in the pews and the words will not be on the screen or in bulletin.

- 8. After discussion, the task force decided to keep the Pray Ground open, along with leaving the toys and books out. This will be monitored and adjusted as needed.
- 9. COVID-19 GREETER DUTIES: After discussion, the following greeter duties were established:
  - A. Greeters should wear name tags (If you need a new name tag, leave a note for the administrator).
  - B. To avoid congestion just beyond the vestibule inside the church, one greeter should be stationed outside the front doors to open the door for worshipers and one just inside the lobby.
  - C. Welcome worshipers. No hugging or hand shaking. Maintain a 6 foot distance.
  - D. Ensure masks are worn. Thank them for wearing their mask. If someone shows up without a mask, please direct them to the table where masks are available for them.
  - E. Inform them that hand sanitizer is available for their use before and after worship.
  - F. Inform them that coats should be taken with them into the sanctuary.
  - G. Please direct them to the ushers who will assist them in finding a seat.
- 10. USHERS: Reviewed the usher duties and made COVID-19 safety additions and changes. The ushers will help the people find a place to sit. They can ask where they would like to sit because people feel more comfortable sitting on a certain side. Pews that can't be used are roped off. The number of people per pew is one or two on each end and possibly one in the middle, or a family in one pew. The Fellowship Hall will be used as an overflow or if people prefer to sit in there. Ushers need to ensure the fishbowl is on a table in the back of the sanctuary for the offering collection (no passing of the collection plates). Ushers will hand out bulletins (wearing gloves) and the prepackaged communion elements on Communion Sunday.
  - People will be dismissed back to front, once the service is over. People will be instructed to put coats on and exit the church immediately.
- 11. COMMUNION: There will be communion with the individual pre-packaged elements (same as used in the parking lot service). Some discussion as to what to do with the empty cups. It was decided to purchase small waste baskets from the Dollar store and put in each open pew. The task force volunteered to take on the ushering and greeters duties, for the first few back to in-person worship services.
- 12. It was decided that three mics will be set up in the front of the church for the reader, Assisting Minister and Pastor. Pastor will use the pulpit, and the reader and Assisting Minister will use the lectern and a music stand station.
- 13. CLEANING A sanitizer mist system will be used to clean the church after the service. We now have the capability to mainstream the service into the Fellowship Hall and not have to limit the numbers at our worship service, Covid numbers are way down and after discussing the above Task Force Report, the council has decided to move forward to in-service worship, effective Ash Wednesday, February 17<sup>th</sup>, Covid guidelines are to be followed {wearing mask and social distancing} at all times. Council reserves the right to make any necessary changes. MSC by Bruce Grundman/Phyllis Ziemke.
- 14. Notice will be put in the newsletter anyone interested in running for council. There are two positions open and one Youth Representative.
- 15. Committee reports need to be submitted to the office so Jean can start to work on them for our Annual Meeting.
- 16. Two additional "Mission of the Month" choices have been brought to our attention. Under World we will add Food for the Poor and Haiti Produce Good Fruit. We will vote on these at the Annual Meeting. MSC by Judy Hellman/Bruce Grundman.
- 17. Annual Meeting has been set for February 28<sup>th</sup>, with a Budget Hearing set for February 21<sup>st</sup>. MSC by Judy Hellman/Pennie Linna. Format for the Agenda will be discussed later.



- 18. Time and Talent sheets were handed out to each committee. As we go back into in-service church PLEASE include these people into your committees.
- 19. After looking back over reports it was noted that we did not send in our pledged amount to the Synod. After discussing this, MSC by Phyllis Ziemke/Judy Hellman to correct this and send the additional \$1,600.
- 20. At this time we discussed the Proposed 2021 Budget.



# Paying it Back — and Forward

During the pandemic, acts of kindness seemed especially meaningful. Last spring, as Covid-19 hit Native American communities particularly hard, an interesting transatlantic outreach occurred. Donations from Ireland began appearing in a relief fund for Navajo and Hopi families, leading administrators to suspect the account had been hacked. Then they realized a cross-generational payback was underway.

In 1847, Choctaw Tribe members sent \$170 overseas to Ireland to help with Potato Famine relief. That generosity was never forgotten, and by May 2020, people in Ireland had contributed more than \$4 million toward pandemic assistance for relatives of people who'd helped their ancestors. Many donors included an Irish proverb meaning "In each other's shadows the people live."

The concept of paying it forward dates back to a 1784 letter by Benjamin Franklin. It also echoes Jesus' Golden Rule: "Do to others as you would have them do to you" (Luke 6:31). How might you live out this practice today?
