We are his people, the sheep of his pasture. Enter his gates with thanksgiving; go into his courts with praise. Give thanks to him and praise his name. For the LORD is good. His unfailing love continues forever, and his faithfulness continues to each generation." (Psalm 100: New Living Translation)

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

I read recently that Psalm 100 is second only to the 23rd Psalm, as the most popular and beloved Psalm in the Bible. Although the Psalm is only 5 verses long, it is a beautiful invitation to all the earth to praise and worship God who both creates us and sustains us.

This Psalm came to mind for me as we turn our calendars to November and look forward to our national holiday of Thanksgiving. Each of us have so much to be thankful for and sometimes it takes a holiday like Thanksgiving to remind us. That is not to say that we don't have individual fears or concerns, but when our troubles are kept in perspective, and set alongside of God's grace and mercy, they do seem more manageable.

The reasons to be thankful will vary from person to person. Some are thankful for life changing events, such as getting a driver's license, graduating from high school or college, the birth of a child, a new relationship, or maybe a promotion at work. Still others are thankful for the on-going love and support of family and friends, the ability to hear beautiful music or a child's laughter, the ability to see wonderful works of art or the vibrant colors of a sunset. When we truly set our minds to a spirit of thankfulness, we can't help but acknowledge God's many blessings.

The psalmist invites us to show our appreciation for God's love and faithfulness in our act of worship. In Psalm 100, we are encouraged to enter God's gates with thanksgiving and go into God's courts with praise as we give thanks and praise God's holy name.

This past couple of years, Covid-19 has made it difficult to fully celebrate and worship as we would like, and yet, I give thanks for all of you and your patience as we have gone through this difficult time together as a community of faith.

I am thankful for those who attended parking lot worship in the bitter cold. I am thankful for those who mask even though they may not be comfortable. I am thankful for those who are willing to accept an elbow bump rather than a handshake or hug. I am thankful for those who feel safer to worship from home and tune into our on Facebook worship each week.

Voices of Peace Gospel Group Re-Scheduled

We were all disappointed when the Voices of Peace gospel group could not participate in our worship service on October 10th. But thankfully, they have re-scheduled and will be with us on November 14th during our regular worship service at 10:00 am.

The mission of the Voices of Peace is to share their faith in music, song, and testimony, so it will inform and encourage people to experience a personal relationship with a loving God through His Son, our Savior, Jesus Christ. They began in 1997 when they launched the 1st outdoor Voices of Peace Gospel Fest in the Hilbert Civic Park, Hilbert, Wisconsin, which continues to be held 2 days annually, on the third Friday and Saturday in August. This 2-day celebration of song and music has expanded through the years and has inspired thousands for the past decade. The group has written 15 original songs and recorded nine CDs. Their music can be heard on numerous radio stations throughout the Midwest,

Alaska, Canada and literally, around the world. They have also appeared on several TV stations throughout Wisconsin. Their music is soothing, comforting, and easy listening, and their goal is to not only provide Christian entertainment, but to minister to those who are searching for a closer walk with God.

We have a joy-filled service of worship and praise planned for the 14th, and you won't want to miss it. We will sing quite a few favorite gospel tunes, and the Voices of Peace group will perform several gospel song selections before our service begins, so you will want to get to church early on that day. Don't miss the opportunity to praise God with the sounds of joyful Gospel music.

The Mission and Vision Team met on October 19th. Members attending were Dawn Jones, Nancy Maslow, Pennie Linna, Ellen LaMarche, Tara Dieck, Mary Jane Hartley, Pastor Bob and Laurie Olson.

Also attending was Fern Fuhrmann representing the Financial and Stewardship Committee.

Pastor Bob opened the meeting with a prayer.

The Mission and Vision Team wanted to meet with the Stewardship and Finance Committee to begin working on the first Ministry Result Area, Connecting Passions to Ministry.

Three objectives were discussed and established, which will assist in identifying individuals' passions, volunteer opportunities and processes of informing members of ways to connect at St. Mark's and/or the community. Outcomes, how to achieve the objectives, who will be the champions of each of the objectives, potential costs, funding sources for the costs, and timelines were developed. The three objectives include:

It was also noted that an event be set to announce the new mission statement and core values. The development of a strategic plan brochure will be designed and made available, similar to the piece presented during our GSB cohort meeting.

Updates from the Returning to In-Person Worship Task Force

At the last meeting of the Returning to In-Person Worship Task Force, they reviewed and discussed the current Winnebago County COVID-19 case numbers. Laurie Olson informed the task force that each weeks' report show an increase in the percentage of Winnebago County residents who have received the vaccination. As of October 14, 56% have been vaccinated. It was noted that COVID-19 case numbers are consistently trending down. It was decided to resume Fellowship Hour beginning October 24. It was also decided to continue with masks and social distancing as safety precautions.

The Task Force agreed to meet soon to review COVID-19 status/data statistics and make further procedure changes, as needed.

Remembering the Saints

When Paul wrote to the church in Rome, he addressed his letter "To all God's beloved ... who are called to be saints" (Romans 1:7, NRSV). Paul regarded his fellow believers as people who have responded to the good news of Christ by choosing to follow and serve God.

The New Testament emphasizes that Christians are God's beloved — special people set apart to receive his grace and to be his witnesses. All people whose minds and hearts are devoted to God are "called to be saints."



About 700 years after the church began, leaders designated November 1 as All Saints' Day to honor people whose lives reflect Christ dwelling within them. Because of what God has done for us, all Christians can wear the label of saint.

On the first Sunday in November, November 7th, we will celebrate All Saints' Sunday here at St. Mark's. There will be a special time of remembrance during the service where all those who have gone to their heavenly home will be remembered. Friends and family members of those being remembered will be invited to come forward and light a candle in their honor. We will include all St. Mark's members who passed away in the past year, but if you have a friend or family member who passed away that you would like to include in our remembrance this year, please call or e-mail the church office and let us know.

Lay School Continuing Education Classes Overview — Part 1 By Jenny Case

Lutheranism 101—We are focusing on the parts of Luther's Small Catechism, including the Ten Commandments, The Apostles' Creed, The Lord's Prayer, The Sacrament of Holy Baptism and Confession, The Sacrament of the Altar, and Daily Prayer and the Household Chart.



Our class time is spent discussing what we read out of our textbook for that month. The book is entitled, "By Heart: Conversations with Martin Luther's Small Catechism." We also answer questions the instructor has included on our syllabus. At the end of class, as a group, we recite together the next month's topic that we will be focusing on in the Small Catechism.

Experiencing God. How and Where God Meets Us—This is another class I am taking. Our topics for this class include: The Problem of Connectivity (the difficulty we have connecting with God), God's Presence is Always on God's Terms, God's Presence in Suffering, Faith as the Experience of God, God's Presence in Word and Sacrament, God Visible in this World and the World to Come, God in the Community of the Faithful, and Spiritual Practices—Lutheran Style.

Our preparation for class is reading a chapter of our text (*Where God Meets Man* by Gerhard D. Forde). We also read a certain passage/scripture from the Bible, as well as an online article. Our instructor also asks us to come up with examples in relation to the topic for that month.

ESTHER Dedicates Peace Tree to Remember Victims of Violence

On October 11th, a white pine was dedicated in a beautiful ceremony in a grove of trees near the Paper Discovery Center in Appleton. This tree was donated by Menominee Tribal Member Adrian Miller. There was a short program which included a variety of speakers and performances. Appleton Mayor Jake Woodford read the proclamation recognizing October 11 as Indigenous Peoples' Day. There was music by the Wolf River Singers, a tribal drum team. Several members of the Menominee tribe spoke, as did Robert Brown of the Oneida Nation. Both Wisconsin Governor Tony Evers and Lt. Governor Mandela Barnes made remarks and shared their commitment to support the effort to combat violence against Indigenous women and girls.





The tree was then dedicated in honor of Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women, Girls and Two Spirits by Kristin Welch of the Waking Women Healing Institute. Following the dedication was the Blessing of the tree by a Menominee tribal member, and then came a Native American prayer, and songs by the Wolf River Singers. We disembarked right by the main door of the arena. The lines leading into the arena were long, but we found the shortest one and after going through security, we found our seats. Then Casting Crowns took the stage and entertained us with many new songs as well as a few oldies.

Casting Crowns is a contemporary Christian band that employs a soft rock music style. The band was created in 1999 by youth pastor Mark Hall, who also serves as lead vocalist. Casting Crowns originally served and performed as part of a youth group in Atlanta, Georgia. After Christian music star Stephen Curtis Chapman heard them, they got a recording contract and vaulted to popularity in 2003 with songs such as "If We Are The Body" and "Who Am I." Some members of the band currently work as ministers for Eagle's Landing First Baptist Church in McDonough, Georgia. The band has won a Grammy and a Dove Award. They put on a great performance.
