Now That's Love

"For I am convinced that neither death, nor life, nor angels, nor rulers, nor things present, nor things to come, nor powers, nor height, nor depth, nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord." Romans 8:38-39

Many years ago, I had the opportunity to go on a Mission trip. I was living in Illinois at the time, and my church organized a trip to help those in need living in Chicago.

When Jesus said to His followers to go out to be His disciples in Jerusalem, and in Judea and Samaria, and the ends of the earth, he meant you can be a disciple anywhere and everywhere. For me, a downstate Illinois native, inner-city Chicago was Samaria. If you recall, Samaritans in Biblical times were generally despised. I didn't exactly despise Chicago, but it did seem to get most of the attention and resources from our state, which was disconcerting. So going to Chicago to do missionary work was a stretch for me.

When I arrived at our mission headquarters, I was assigned to lead a group that would spend the week renovating a classroom in an impoverished Lutheran School on the South Side. We made our way to the school where we were greeted by a young man who was both principal and 6th grade teacher. He looked tired and not especially happy to see us. The work was hard. The walls were plaster that was cracked and dirty, and painted lime green. There were radiators to work around and a large mural on one wall that we needed to restore. The walls were at least 12 feet tall. It was a mess.

By mid-week, I was ready to give up. But while we were moping and eating our sack lunches one day, we heard the squeals of children playing. We looked outside the windows and there below us was a group of 4-year-olds playing on the sidewalk with a frazzled-looking woman supervising them. The young folks in our group were enchanted and went outside to play with them. We discovered these were neighborhood children who attended a day care in the basement of the school. We checked out their classroom and it was bare bones – just a big room with some tables and chairs, a few toys, and even fewer books.

We started our afternoon work with renewed vigor. Those kids would someday use this classroom and we wanted to make it good for them. But driving back to our headquarters, we talked about doing more. After dinner that night and before our closing devotions, we made our way to a bookstore and found a bunch of children's books about love, most by Christian authors. We bought one for each child and on the last day of our trip, we had a party for them where we presented each child with a book and then we spent some time reading to them. We talked about Jesus and how much he loves them. The children, some of whom had never received a present before, were so happy. They loved having us there, and we loved being there with them. There were lots of hugs and kisses when we said good-by.

That night at our closing worship service, one young girl from our group told about our experience with the children. Likewise, other people from other groups gave testimonials about what they experienced and it wasn't just doing the labor, but touching lives and being God's witnesses. I can remember the leader of the mission team saying something like, "Wow, you can really feel the love in here tonight."

He was right. I have to count that trip as one of the times I felt very, very close to God. I could sense God's presence in all that happened that week. What appeared to be an insurmountable task for our group was completed on time and in good order (thanks to God's grace and the help of another team that finished their assignment early). In everything, God's love was shining through.

I contrast that experience with these days of Covid, the political squabbling we see on the news, and the imminent threat of war – these times when it is hard for me to see God's love in my life. But then I realize if I concentrate on those things, I am probably looking for God in the wrong places.

I have no doubt God loves me and you. I learned that in Sunday School many years ago. And given all the Bible passages about God's love for His children, the one that stirs me the most is Romans 8. In it, the apostle Paul expounds on Christ's amazing love for all of us. If anyone could question God's love, Paul would be a likely candidate. Here was a man who had suffered greatly. He had been beaten, rejected, imprisoned, and shipwrecked. But Paul states in Romans that his sufferings are nothing compared to God's love and the good times that he (and we) can look forward to.

What kept Paul going in times of trial was what he called the "First Fruits of the Spirit" (Rom. 8:23). The Holy Spirit helped him focus ahead to the glory that was to come. It interceded on his behalf, and it can do the same for us. The moment you think you are too tired or too old or in too much pain to go on, God's Spirit is there within you. And God's love? Well, it is there too, and the great part of this Scripture passage in Romans is the reminder that nothing (NOTHING!) can separate us from it. Romans 8:35-39 lists seventeen different possibilities of trials that can impact our lives, and then Paul concludes that verse saying that none of these "will be able to separate us from the love of God that is in Christ Jesus our Lord." Nothing. No one. Never!

February is considered the month of love, and if you are looking for a beautiful sentiment that tells you that you are loved like no other, forget the mushy Valentine's Day cards and take a look at Romans 8. If you haven't already, you will most definitely "feel the love" that surrounds you each day as God's Holy Spirit fills your heart and Christ himself intercedes on your behalf. Thank you, God, for your everlasting love! — Jean Memken, Church Administrator


We updated our committee budget from \$12,125 to \$16,825 for 2022. The need for supply pastors was the biggest reason for the increase.

The transition period is a time for the congregation to evaluate its ministries, staffing, purpose and vision asking questions, "Where is God leading us?", "Who is God calling us to be?", "If our congregation disappeared, would we be missed? How?", "If we could do something that God would want us to do, what would that be?", and "What is our best ministry, and how could God use this in the world?"

- A Ministry Site Profile (MSP) committee has been formed and approved by St. Mark's Church Council. The team, along with council members, attended a 9 AM noon orientation on Saturday, January 23. Staff from the *East Central Synod Wisconsin* reviewed the Ministry Site Profile document and gave suggestions and tips on developing an impactful, honest and authentic representation of St. Mark's. Additionally, discussed how we determine the skills/gifts we'd like to see in our next Pastor and to communicate, that as a congregation, we are ready and willing to *walk alongside* our Pastor to make a difference. This process will take around three months. We ask for prayers and support, as we move through this important work of the church. We ask for participation in brief surveys. We ask for excitement in where God is leading us.
- A **Call Committee** will eventually be formed. The Call Committee will receive and review candidate profiles provided by the synod office, interview candidates and listen to candidates' sermons. They will recommend a final candidate to the council and congregation. Please contact Laurie Olson, if you are willing to serve on this committee.




MOSES MESSAGE

A Sunday School Update



I never thought I would ever want to participate in on-line automatic giving at church. I grew up with parents who believed placing an envelope in the offering plate was a very important part of worship. Week after week, they would write a check on Saturday night, and put it in the plate when it passed by our pew on Sunday morning. I continued that tradition when I started my own household. On-line giving just didn't seem like it was appropriate. If you didn't have to do something related to giving each week, would you even think about being a good steward and thanking God for the gifts He gives?

But as I have been working with the new format that our on-line giving has taken here at St. Mark's, I'm hooked. With the online version, I can log into a secure website on my home computer and prepare my offering on-line just like I wrote a check and placed in my giving envelope before. If I know I am going to be out of town for a few weeks, I can actually schedule my offerings to go to St. Mark's every weekend until I get back. Moreover, I can now also designate my "Mission of the Month" offering once a month and I can pay for any flowers I donate for the altar. I am excited that I can make a Scrip payment on-line and I think I might have to take advantage of that program now. On top of that, if I am not near my computer, I can use the Vanco Mobile App on my smart phone and give my offering using my phone— I never have to worry about not having my checkbook or offering envelope again.

I grew up paying for just about everything by check, but checks are not so handy anymore, and they are expensive. Paying online actually saves me money by not having to use my checks. I have my giving set up to come directly out of my checking account, but I can also pay by credit card and then take care of paying when my credit card bill is due. It is so handy to give my offering this way, and I still have the opportunity to consider my stewardship each week as I log-on and make my donation. And as I thank God for my blessings, I include a thank you for the technology that allows this to happen!


