Do You Have the Time?

So, I have known Bible account of Mary and Martha since I was a child. You remember Mary and Martha? Jesus paid them a visit and Mary sat at his feet while her sister Martha worked tirelessly to make sure there was something to feed their special guest. I always liked that story, imagining what it must have been like to have Jesus right in your own home. But there was kind of sticking point that stayed with me every time I heard it. You see, I come from a family of Marthas. And it always seemed to me that Martha never got the proper recognition for her efforts in that story.

I grew up on a farm which meant long days of work for the whole family. My father and brother would come in from the field, and my mom would always have a nice dinner for them. As I got a little older, I would help with this, setting the table and other simple chores, which was when I learned my way around the kitchen, a skill I am very thankful for.

That skill wasn't wasted at holiday family gatherings and family reunions. The women gathered in the kitchen before and after the meal to work (and talk, of course) and the men retired to the living room, or outside in nice weather. All of this was perfect training to be a Martha. If someone came to our home unexpectedly, time to mobilize! Get the coffee on. What snack or dessert can we serve? If they stay for dinner, what can we make? Full blown Martha mode!

I once had the opportunity to do a more in-depth study of this lovely story of Mary and Martha, and I learned what probably really happened on the day Jesus came for a visit. First, Jesus was traveling with his disciples when he visited the sisters in Bethany, so Martha wasn't just making a meal for Jesus, but probably had at least 13 guests and maybe more in her house. You can understand her anxiousness about getting the work done to feed this crowd.

Secondly, preparing a meal in Biblical times was no easy feat, especially when you consider that the cook not only prepared the food, she had to grow, raise or barter for every ingredient. The cooktop and oven was a fire pit outdoors, and of course, there was no refrigeration, so things had to be prepared and eaten quickly or they would spoil. Just to make a loaf of bread would mean growing the wheat, harvesting it, grinding the grain into flour, fetching water from the river, pressing olives to get some oil, and then mixing the water and oil with the flour and baking it in an outdoor oven. Then she had to prepare the rest of the meal. Can you see why Martha wanted Mary to help her a little bit?

Although women's roles in biblical times were firmly set, Jesus changed things for women then (and now) in many ways. Jesus encouraged women to learn, he wanted the best for them. He taught women and called on women to tell the Good News about his ministry. He healed them, he showed them compassion and respect. He honored them and even elevated one above the temple leaders (remember the poor widow and her mites? Jesus said she gave the best offering of all).

None of this was lost on Martha's sister, Mary. If Jesus dared to be different, Mary was anxious to embrace that. So when Jesus came to the house, she wanted to hear what he had to say. She wanted to be near him. She was happy to be able to sit at his feet and learn from him.

When Martha complained to Jesus about Mary's lack of help, he admonished her in such a loving way: "Martha, Martha, you are anxious and troubled about many things, but one thing is necessary. Mary has chosen the good portion, which will not be taken away from her." (Luke 10:41-42). In other words, Martha, while you are busy making a meal, the main course is already being served. Don't you want some?

And that is how the story ends. We don't know what Martha did. Do you think she rolled her eyes, turned around and headed back to the meal preparation, or did she tell Mary to scoot over so she could sit at Jesus' feet as well? Luke doesn't tell us. But maybe that's the whole point of this story.

Martha had a busy schedule – maybe a little too busy for Jesus, even though all her work was supposedly for him. And sometimes I find myself falling into that trap as well. Remember, I was raised to be a good Martha! Throughout my life I was very good at rationalizing why I needed to do something at home other than read my Bible or daily devotions. Too busy to sit down and spend a little time talking to God in prayer. There was my career, my husband, my kids, my volunteer activities (mostly at my church, ironically), so much to do! Sound familiar?

What do you think Jesus might say to us if we came to him with all our excuses of being busy? Probably the same thing he said to Martha. (Insert your name), you are anxious about all the things you have to do, but what I offer is all you really need. And then just like with Martha, he gives us a choice.

I'm not suggesting you abandon the responsibilities in your life, but I hope you will heed Christ's words to Martha, and make a little more time for him, especially as we embark on this season of Lent. I am looking forward to our Wednesday evening worship services this year, which focus on God's mercy. In these difficult times, we need God's mercy more than ever! During this Lenten season, let's make it a point to be like Mary and resist that Martha "I don't have time for that" mentality, if even just for an hour. Let's choose that "good portion" that will never be taken away. May God bless your Lenten journey.--jm


Worship & Music Committee - January 25th, 2022 ~ Submitted by Judy Hellman

Hope Clinic & Care Center is a new "Mission of the Month" for us! This article is from their Executive Director, Shelby Miller.



The Hope Clinic and Care Center started in November 2015 in Appleton, WI. The Clinic was open 1-2 days per week. In 2019, with information from the UW Madison's Population Health Institute, the National Association of Free and Charitable Clinics, and the local Public Health Departments, we learned that Length of Life and Quality of Life in equal measure were affected by factors beyond health care. Healthcare or more specifically, Clinical Care, impacted both Length of Life and Quality of Life. Other factors affecting length and quality of life were Health Behaviors; Social and Economic Factors; and the Physical Environment. With this

information, we started our social assistance referral program to help those with additional needs such as rent, utilities, job training, dental care, etc. These referrals are in addition to our primary service of healthcare, which includes primary and some specialty care, labs, medications, medication assistance, and counseling. In the fall of 2020, we added our Care Management program which works with patients to address their health behaviors by encouraging them, talking with them, and more. In the fall of 2021 we added a care navigation process which now provides a navigator to walk alongside the individual to help them make a call, fill out an application, or link them to other needed services.

We have helped over 2,800 individuals since 2015 and had over 11,400 patient visits/interactions. In 2018, we moved to Goodwill Headquarters of North Central Wisconsin in Menasha. We expanded our hours to four days a week, Mondays through Thursdays, from 9-5 pm. We try to help our patients in all sorts of situations. For example, the Hope Clinic front desk coordinator received a phone call from the office of WIC (Women, Infants and Children Nutrition Program). They had a woman in their office who was quite distraught and they were looking for assistance to help her, both physically and mentally. We were able to get her an appointment the next day with one of our Nurse Practitioners who specializes in psychiatry. When this patient came in for an appointment, she was feeling very depressed. She had suffered a miscarriage and felt that she had been mistreated at her doctor's office. Our NP took the time to really listen and came up with a plan to assist in her healing. Due to her complex medical problems, we scheduled a follow up appointment with one of our volunteer physician's and also scheduled an

appointment for her with our counselor. This patient was also enrolled into the care management program that involves having a nurse call and check in with her between provider visits. There is a lot of medical and emotional healing that still needs to be done, but with the TLC of our entire staff, it is very possible. What an honor it is that we can walk alongside others in their time of need. Please check us out at www.hopeclinic.care.

This year's Synod Assembly service project will be partnering with Sleep in Heavenly Peace, a non-profit committed to making sure no child has to sleep on the floor by building twin-sized bunk beds. East-Central Synod of Wisconsin will be partnering with SHP in hosting a "build" day where they hope to construct at least 20 bunk beds. These are solidly built beds that will last for years.

How St. Mark's plans to help out:

- 1. **Donations to fund the build day.** The Worship and Music Committee, along with the Church Council, have designated the Wednesday evening Lenten Service offerings to this project.
- 2. **Volunteers for the Build Day**—Willing hands are needed Saturday, May 7th, to help build bunk beds. St. Andrew's Lutheran Church in Oshkosh will be the host site. While experience is helpful, it is not necessary! The synod has a goal of making 20 beds! Those who are interested can register on the synod website: www.ecsw.org/synod-assembly. It would be great to have volunteers from St. Mark's participate in this Build Day!
- 3. A bed isn't really fit for sleep without bedding! We are also invited to collect NEW twin-sized sheets and comforters, as well as pillows, mattress pads, and protectors, to make these beds comfy and cozy for the children who will receive them. Items will then be gathered for the assembly and given to SHP for the beds. Quilts that are made should be comfortable for children and may be full or twin sized. SHP requests NO white sheets. A collection box will be set up at church for these items. All items need to be dropped off at the collection site on May 8th, so please have your donations to St. Mark's by May 4th.


WEEK THREE Mercy in Betrayal • Though we may turn away from our God again and again, our Lord continues to call us back into his merciful arms for Jesus' sake.


WEEK FOUR Mercy in Relationships • Within the communities God has placed us, we are given the grace to treat one another as Christ has cared for us in his love and mercy.
