Come, Holy Spirit

I am sure you have heard the words in the title of this article many times, but the phrase bears repeating, especially as we approach the season of Pentecost. "Come, Holy Spirit" – I say that little prayer every time I take communion. Perhaps you do, too. But what are we really asking for when we say, "Come, Holy Spirit." What do we really know about this somewhat elusive part of the Holy Trinity?

I once participated in a Bible Study that examined the role of the Holy Spirit in relation to the spiritual gifts that are listed in the Bible, and it seemed the more we studied the Holy Spirit, the more I realized how little I really knew about this third person of the Trinity.

First, to be clear, God is present today with us in the form of the Holy Spirit. So we don't really need to ask for His presence. We believe that the Holy Spirit is planted in the heart of a person when they are baptized. So asking God for the Holy Spirit doesn't really mean you need His presence, but rather, you would like to sense His presence to a greater degree.

When we take communion, it is probably the closest we can get to God this side of heaven. We ask for the Holy Spirit to be present so that we can truly experience that amazing meal in the way God wants us to. When we pray, "Come, Holy Spirit" we are asking God to reveal himself in our lives as we partake of Christ's very body and blood. It is a prayer for reverence, wonder and the comfort and peace only God can provide. It is a prayer asking God to reveal His power and will in our lives. That can be a wonderful and scary proposition all at the same time. Let's look at what happened to people when they experienced the Holy Spirit.

The Holy Spirit came upon Sampson and gave him his strength. It says in Judges 15:13, "The Spirit of the Lord came powerfully upon him [Sampson]." David was blessed with the Holy Spirit in his life. In 1 Samuel 16:13, it says, "And from that day on, the Spirit of the Lord came powerfully upon David."

The idea of the Holy Spirit taking the form of a cloud "hovering" is frequent in Scripture. In Genesis 1:2 it says, "Now the earth was formless and empty, darkness was over the surface of the deep, and the Spirit of God was hovering over the waters." The children of Israel experienced God's Spirit as a pillar of cloud during the day. After Solomon build the temple, scripture says in 1 Kings 8:10-11, "When the priests withdrew from the Holy Place, the cloud filled the temple of the Lord."

When Jesus was baptized, the Holy Spirit descends from the clouds above "like a dove" and hence, we use the dove as a symbol for the Holy Spirit, but we could just as well use a cloud as it seems like the Spirit manifests itself in that way throughout the Bible.

So why would experiencing the Holy Spirit be scary? Well, think about the first Pentecost. When God's Spirit is poured out on the disciples, they experienced a rushing wind. They saw tongues of fire. They spoke different languages. There were so many things happening that all who were present knew that this was not mortal men's doing, but God Himself was among them. That sounds a little scary.

With God's Spirit as their guide, the disciples went throughout the area and performed many miracles, particularly healing the sick. Wonderful, but also scary!

Once the disciples were gathered together and they prayed for God's Spirit to be present, and the room where they were meeting began to shake. I bet if that happened here at St. Mark's we would all be a bit scared.

The Spirit the disciples called upon is the same Spirit we call upon today, and when we ask that Spirit to come upon us, we must accept the way it comes and what it brings. And, even more importantly, we need to use the spiritual gifts it provides. That is a wonderful, albeit a little scary, truth. The apostle Paul is a prime example of how the Spirit can transform lives. Paul, who persecuted the church, was touched by the Spirit to dedicate everything he had and everything he did to furthering God's kingdom and telling the good news about Jesus.

But rather than anticipate the Holy Spirit with fear, Paul's example shows us all the good things that happen when living a Spirit-filled life. With God's Spirit, Paul experienced *success*, especially as he preached to the Gentiles. The Spirit can bring opposition, but also the *strength* to withstand that opposition. Paul was threatened and imprisoned, and yet the Spirit helped him continue his mission. The Holy Spirit brings *joy*. No matter what happened to Paul, he accepted it with joy, knowing that the Spirit was with him. And finally, it brings *boldness*. Despite threats and persecution, Paul continued to boldly talk about Jesus.

The more I learn about the Holy Spirit, the more I realize what a tremendous privilege it is to be able to spend time with God and feel His presence in my life. To spend time in God's presence, whether it be with others in Bible study or worship, or by myself when I get out my prayer list or read my daily devotion, I am so much more renewed each time I am with Him and He with me. It is my prayer that you sense that renewal and exhilaration as well as the Holy Spirit takes hold of your life and leads you to sense God's presence. Come, Holy Spirit, yes indeed, Come!—jm

Report from the Synod Assembly

On May 13-14, our Synod held their annual Assembly where delegates gathered either online or in person at the at the Best Western Convention Center in Oshkosh. Theme for the Assembly this year was "To Live Among God's Faithful People." Our delegates were Sharyn Gawlick and Sherri Denney. Jenny Case also attended some of the sessions. The following is a summary of the business that was transacted and the activities that were included.



The business of the Assembly Included:

Adoption of the 2023 Budget

Compensation Guidelines were adopted for the year 2023 and are recommended for congregations as they work to faithfully compensate rostered ministers.

 Amendments to the Synod Constitution were presented to the Assembly for consideration at the 2023 Synod Assembly.

Six Resolutions were passed:

- Participate in Pray Act Connect Education (PACE) to Reduce Hunger in our Neighbors Near and Far
- 2. Encourage Synod Women of the ELCA Be Bold to Act
- 3. Safe Gathering Spaces for All God's Children
- 4. Resolution to Work for Racial Equity
- 5. Diverse Books Support Cross-Cultural Literacy
- 6. A Memorial Calling for a Just Transition to 50% Reduction in US Greenhouse Gas Emissions by 2030, as amended
- 7. New leadership was elected to serve in various capacities.
- Elected to Synod Council: Rev. Mary Bauer, Breanna Linna, John Murphy, Dia Arpon, Janet Zander, Rev. Cheryl Davis
- Elected Secretary of Synod Council: Rev. Nate Gauerke
- Elected to the Committee on Discipline: Rev. Benjamin Williams
- Elected to the Consultation Committee: Rev. Dan Luett, Rev. Dr. Niveen Sarras
- Deep gratitude was conveyed by Bishop Anne for all those willing to serve, including those who were not elected. Several vacant positions with no nominees presented will be appointed by Synod Council.

Thank you for the gifts that were given.

- Funds were raised for 50 beds donated to the Oshkosh chapter of Sleep in Heavenly Peace.
- In kind donations of sheets and bedding were giving to the Oshkosh, Waupaca, and Green Bay chapters of Sleep in Heavenly Peace.
- Build day included over 85 volunteers of all ages who worked to complete 40 beds and made parts for several more.

NOTE ON HOLY COMMUNION: The In-Person Task Force had recommended going back to regular Holy Communion, beginning in June. However, due to the increased COVID numbers and concerns from numerous members, we will continue using the pre-packaged elements in the pews. If numbers begin to go down, the task force will again review the communion procedure.



The Call Committee is accepting candidates to interview. All initial interviews will be done virtually. An in-person interview (second interview) will be scheduled with a candidate, if the Call Committee is interested in the candidate. As of May 23rd, one candidate has shown interest and a virtual interview has been scheduled. This process may take a couple more months or many months. Please keep the Call Committee in your prayers, as they continue with this important work of our church.

In the meantime, please consider helping out during this transition. As many of you know, during transition times, churches are assigned an interim Pastor, to assist with coordinating and presiding over weekly worship services, having office hours (handling of church business), caring for those in need (emergency care), assisting with Christian Education programs, etc. (All the duties that a called Pastor would be responsible for). Due to the lack of available interim Pastors, we were not assigned someone. As noted in a previous newsletter, we have entered into a covenant with Gloria Dei Lutheran Church, Neenah. That agreement states that Pastors Tabitha and Jon will be our emergency care Pastors (hospital visits and end of life care, for example), be available for needed Sunday worship coverage (no more than twice a month and if it works into their schedules) and attend Worship & Music and Christian Education Committee Meetings. St. Mark's is paying Gloria Dei Church a monthly stipend for Pastors Tabitha and Jon to be on call 24/7 for emergency care. In addition, we pay a supply Pastor fee for them presiding over worship, and a per/hour fee for meetings, phone calls, etc. All other church duties, including obtaining weekly Pastors or Lay Persons and coordinating the worship service content, are being handled by Committees, Jean iMemken n church office, and myself.

Our current needs: Become a member of one of the many St. Mark's committees, read scripture during a worship service, host fellowship, usher, counter (giving envelopes) or greeter on Sundays, sponsor the altar flowers, etc. If you have a talent or skill, that may not fit into one of ministry areas, please let me know, so I can help you in sharing that with St. Mark's.



The Church Council has approved the replacement purchase of three new handheld and two bodypack wireless microphones, along with receivers and set-up for a cost of approximately \$4,700. (Our current wireless microphones are many years old and are not functioning properly.) The *Karen Thompson Memorial Fund* will be used to cover the expense of this purchase. Thank you, LuAnn Gorecki, for seeing the value in using your mother's memorial funds for this project. Due to supply chain issues, it may take some time to get the microphones in.



The Food Pantry has been very busy lately. Every week we've been getting one or two new people signing up to get help. In April we had 40 families getting food to help feed 108 family members. A lot of our patrons are seniors and also quite a few single people with

children. With your help, we have been stocking some milk and fruit, as well as the staples. At this moment our greatest need is for paper towels, sweetened cereal, and sugar. Thank you so much for your generosity. We all appreciate your help. — *Karen Jordan*


