We Have a New Pastor!

Pastor Dr. Niveen Ibrahim Sarras, PhD

Pastor Niveen Ibrahim Sarras (PhD), age 41, has served as the Pastor at Immanuel Lutheran Church in Wausau, WI, since 2016. As a Palestinian woman, born in Bethlehem (in the West Bank), a member of a Christian family among a population of Muslim majority, Pastor Niveen has experienced the war between the Israelis and the Palestinians firsthand. Her first bachelor's degree in Biblical studies was earned in Cairo, Egypt, to which she had fled during hostilities. This was followed by her first master's degree earned in theological studies at a Presbyterian seminary in Cairo. When she returned to Bethlehem, she was aware that in her country a woman cannot be a spiritual leader. Her heart led her first to Chicago, IL, and then to Berkley, CA, where

she would earn additional master's degrees in theological studies and in divinity. A PhD in Old Testament Studies of the Hebrew Bible from the Lutheran School of Theology at Chicago completes Pastor Niveen's background. Proficiencies in Hebrew, English, and German languages afford her the ability to study Biblical texts (and the writings of Luther) in their original languages. Learning, teaching, and sharing messages of love and hope are a core part of who she is; however, so are gardening, hiking, and sharing a good cup of tea with friends. Sharing the Word is integral to who Pastor Niveen is. She has presented papers on topics from the Bible and taught classes in continuing education at Wisconsin universities. Pastor Niveen will preside over her first worship service at St. Mark's on Sunday, November 6, 2022.



Hallelujah! God is Good! We have a new Pastor. Please read above the information on Pastor Niveen. The first preaching Sunday for Pastor Niveen will be November 6. The Connections Committee, Church Council, and Call Committee will be hosting and inviting you to a small group meet and greet event, in order for Pastor Niveen to get to know our church families and for you to get to know her. date and reception will be scheduled a few weeks after the start date of Pastor Niveen, so that she can be a part of the planning.

I would like to thank the Call Committee, Ministry Site Profile Committee, Church Administrator Jean Memken, the Church Council, and the East Central Synod of Wisconsin for their service during this transition period. Additionally, thank you Committees for all the sharing of gifts you've done, to ensure the continuation of our ministry work. Finally, I thank all who prayed and trusted in the transition process.


Devotions were given by Jenny Case. Betty Linna volunteered for devotions in September.

We closed our meeting with the Lord's Prayer. Our next meeting will be Monday, September 19th.






Education Committee - August 27, 2022 ~ Submitted by Gwen Hoehne, Superintendent

Reviewed the end of the month current account balance. July 2022 giving was \$12,868.94 and expenses were \$7,399.56. Difference was +\$5,469.38. Year to date giving towards monthly expenses is +\$29,936.38. It was again pointed out that the positive net is reflective of not paying for a full-time Pastor salary, medical insurance, pension, etc.

Total Associated Bank checking has a balance of \$172,298.63, which includes \$62,779.21 allocated to designated accounts. Additionally, \$104,300.00 in the Thrivent money market and \$51,156.76 in the Thrivent T.I.P. account and \$52,855.76 in the ELCA Mission Investment Fund.


All Saints' Sunday will be a Celebration of Life

New Freezer Expands Food Pantry Storage

Once again, our Food Pantry has been blessed to be able to buy another new upright frost-free freezer. Several months ago, Feeding America informed all their clients that there were additional funds available from the "Build Back Better" legislation that had to be used to alleviate food insecurity in the state of Wisconsin. They put out a call for grant applications, and Jean Memken submitted a grant asking for

funds for another upright freezer. You may recall we received funding from this source earlier this year to purchase a new refrigerator and freezer for the pantry.

Last week, we were informed that our second grant application would be fully funded. In the letter we received about the grant, we were informed that there were many excellent applications and not all could be funded, but ours was one that was selected for funding. So we now have a new General Electric 14.2 cubic foot freezer, and it is already being put to good use. In the future, we will be able to take advantage of sales of meat and frozen food items which can be stored in our new freezer, and we have more room for other frozen items that are donated to the pantry.

St Mark's Endowment Fund August 2022 Report

The Endowment committee is responsible for managing Endowment funds and granting requests. The fund was established in 1985 with a gift from Louis Baer. The fund has grown with other contributions since then. The committee meets as needed to review requests and monitor our investments. The Endowment Fund grants requests based on the money earned while preserving the principal of the account. The principal in the account is now \$ 163,939.00. Grants are meant for the betterment of the Christian church as a whole. Some examples of grants include the following: special music, bible camp, Lay School, youth groups, bible study materials, missionaries, and mission churches.







Women from St. Mark's attended the WELCA 2022 Fall Retreat on Saturday, September 24 at Imago Dei in Clintonville. The theme was "Sisters in Christ United for Allyship." Allyship is "an active, consistent, and arduous practice of unlearning and re-evaluation, in which a person in a position of privilege and power seeks to operate in solidarity with a marginalized group." The day consisted of Keynote Speaker Bill Van Lopik on "Building Strong and Equitable Communities Through Allyship," Worship and Holy Communion, lunch, devotions, silent auction, and guest speakers sharing their personal stories on their lives before, during, and after incarceration.

Finishing Well

In October, many Lutherans turn their thoughts to Martin Luther as we celebrate the Reformation at the end of the month. Luther led an amazing life. He was a prolific writer, and thanks to the invention of the printing press during his lifetime, his essays and letters were spread throughout the Holy Roman Empire, making him a big celebrity of the day. Most of his written work was insightful and uplifting, bringing many into a closer relationship with Christ. But, some of his last writings were about the Jewish race, and were used by Adolph Hitler to justify the Holocaust.

Given all the wonderful things that Luther did, not only for the church, but also for education, family life, and the entire western culture, there is, sadly, that one black spot on his legacy. No one really knows why Luther wrote those antisemitic words, but he did. And even though every Lutheran denomination has renounced those writings, they remain a part of history.



We know that when Luther wrote words of condemnation of the Jewish race, things were not going well for him. He was not well physically or mentally. He was known to have bouts of depression throughout this time. His body was failing in many ways – no doubt he was in continual pain. In addition, his young daughter had just died, and he was very grieved by that. He watched her die from her bedside which must have been devastating. It wasn't long after and he died himself.

In the grand scheme of things, Luther had an amazing life and we rejoice at all the good he accomplished throughout it. But he did not finish that life very well. If you are a Bible reader, you know there are examples of several Godly men who also did not finish well. Take, for example, Saul, first king of Israel, who was described as an upright man, very tall with a commanding presence. At the beginning of his reign, he was described as having the gift of prophecy. Obviously, God's Spirit was upon him.

For many years, Saul had a successful reign of Israel. But then his pride got the best of him. After winning a battle, Saul became impatient for the priest Samuel to show up for a sacrifice to honor God for the victory. So Saul went ahead and sacrificed on the Lord's altar himself. That doesn't seem like such a bad thing, but it was just the beginning of his disobedience. When he won another important battle, he wanted to build a statue to honor himself rather than offering a sacrifice to God. His downfall was swift, and as David moved in to succeed him, Saul died a sad, suicidal death during battle. Saul did not finish well.

Likewise, King Solomon was noted for his great wisdom and for building God's first permanent temple. But as he got older, his lust for sex caused him to marry over 700 women and engage over 300 concubines. Many of these women were foreigners, in direct defiance to God's command not to intermarry. It wasn't long before Solomon was building temples to worship a variety of foreign gods. As he ended his life, his kingdom was divided and just a small fraction of the land and the people were under his family's reign. Solomon definitely did not finish well.

In contrast, there are many examples of people who maybe didn't start off life in obedience to the Lord, but managed to finish very well. Probably the best example of that is the apostle, Paul. Remember, we first meet Paul in the Bible at the stoning of Stephen, where it is said, "he approved of Stephen's stoning." Then he terrorized the early Christians and threw them in prison for their beliefs. Truly a bad start to his adult life.

But boy, did Paul finish well. Converted by Christ himself, he was probably the greatest evangelist of the new Christian church, converting many people, particularly the Gentiles, to Christianity. His faith emanates from all he wrote, and serves as a guide and inspiration for all.

Likewise, the disciple Peter seemed to often be doing and saying things that were contrary to Christ's guidance. He fell asleep when Christ asked him to pray in the Garden of Gethsemane, and he denied Jesus three times during His trial. But Peter went on to do great things after Christ ascended into heaven. It was Peter who spoke to the crowds at Pentecost, converting thousands to Christ. He healed the sick and continued to evangelize throughout the rest of his life. Peter finished well.

So, what does that mean for us? We can all finish well, no matter how we started. There is no mistake too big, no regret too heavy, no sin too terrible, that can't be erased from our life by the love of God the Father, the sacrifice of God the Son, and the power of God the Holy Spirit. Whenever I doubt that, I turn to one of my favorite parts of the Bible, John 14. Remember Christ's words: "Do not let your hearts be troubled. You believe in God; believe also in me. My Father's house has many rooms; if that were not so, would I have told you that I am going there to prepare a place for you? And if I go and prepare a place for you, I will come back and take you to be with me that you also may be where I am." From those words, I know this:

- Jesus always has a plan for me, and he has been with me every step of the way. I know he will continue to be there when I need Him.
- Jesus is coming back for me. Our finish here on earth is not really the end for those who believe in him. I'm a sinner, just like Luther, like Paul, and like everyone else, and I plan to finish here on earth well, but my true end is in heaven.

And why do I know this? That's the work of the Holy Spirit. He lives in me (and in you), giving us strength to take whatever this world throws at us and knowledge that God is there to help us when we need him.

Jesus wants us to continue the mission he started over 2,000 years ago. His life on earth was relatively short, but he truly finished it well, and made it possible that we can finish just as well, doing the work that God has given us to do, and then looking forward to a heavenly face to face when our work here is done. Praise be to our Triune God for that assurance. – jm

One more note: As we end this period of transition, this will be my last devotional for the newsletter. I have truly enjoyed this opportunity to write out my thoughts about my Savior Jesus.
