Dear New Family of St. Mark's Lutheran Church,

Grace and peace to you.

With great appreciation for the Lord Jesus and his leading in my life, I begin my journey here at St. Mark's Lutheran Church, serving as your new pastor. I wanted to take this opportunity to share my background with you and send a brief note of thanks for accepting me here as part of your church family. Rest assured, I am looking forward to a joyous and fruitful ministry in the years to come.

I was born and raised in Bethlehem, Palestine, to a family of seven. My ancestors have been Christians since the Pentecost. I grew up in an open-minded ecumenical family. My late father, Ibrahim, belonged to the Greek Orthodox church. My mother, Kathrin Selvia, is a devoted Catholic and lives in Bethlehem. My big sister, Nisreen (Issa), lives in Belgium. My younger late sister Suha, my youngest sister Abeer (Alaa', Jezelle & Joelle), and my youngest brother Odeh (Marina), are in Bethlehem. All my siblings and I were baptized in the Greek Orthodox Church, but we grew up Lutheran by attending Lutheran school and Sunday school.

Since I was a little girl, I have been interested in the Bible. My family was not surprised when I told them I wanted to have a degree in Biblical studies. They never expected me to become a pastor because, until now, as I am writing this letter, no female Palestinian pastor has been ordained in my country. However, the bishop will ordain his daughter in January 2023.

During studying at Bethlehem Bible College, my friend invited me to attend a mass in a Catholic Church in my hometown. During the service, and as the priest was celebrating the Holy Communion, I felt a deep touch on my chest and a strong feeling or voice telling me, "I want you to celebrate the Holy Communion like this priest." I asked myself how that was possible if women were not allowed to become pastors. I had a sense of peace, and I felt it was possible. "Jesus says, "What is impossible with people is possible with God" (Luke 18:27).

I went to Egypt to study for three years to get a Master of Arts in biblical studies, and then I went back to Palestine to serve as the director of Christian education at the Christmas Lutheran Church. I enjoyed serving God with youth and children. But the time came when I had to advance my knowledge of the Bible. I attended the Lutheran School of Theology in Chicago to earn my TH. M and Ph.D. degrees in Old Testament. I also attended The Pacific Lutheran Theological Seminary to earn my Master of Divinity. I was ordained on October 29, 2016, and served at Immanuel Lutheran Church in Wausau, WI, for six years.



The Endowment committee is responsible for managing Endowment funds and granting requests. The fund was established in 1985 with a gift from Louis Baer. The fund has grown with other contributions since then. The committee meets as needed to review requests and monitor our investments. The Endowment Fund grants requests based on the money earned while preserving the principal of the account. The principal in the account is now \$163,939.00. Grants are meant for the betterment of the Christian church as a whole. Some examples of grants include the following: special music, bible camp, Lay School, youth groups, bible study materials, missionaries, and mission churches.

Laurie opened with a devotion.

Mary Jane reviewed the giving for September which was \$15,020.42 and spending was \$11,675.42. Our giving was over our spending by \$3,345. Laurie and Mary Jane met with our Thrivent agent Chris and determined that it would be practical to take \$47,029 from the TIP account and move it into the Thrivent Mutual Funds to prevent further loss of funds in connection to the status of the market. The TIP account will remain open with \$1,003.37, so if in the future the market returns to being more stable, we can return to investing in it.

The third quarter reports were prepared and are ready for congregational members.

The committee reviewed the letter that will accompany the intent cards and the Ministry Gifts form. Laurie has redesigned the time and talent sheet to reflect our change in focus to be on our Ministry gifts. Stewardship Sunday will be November 13, 2022. Our stewardship project of asking members how they celebrate their faith at St. Mark's is complete and the pictures are on the walls and in the napkin holders. The committee was also videotaped describing and inviting people to join the finance and stewardship committee. The Committee videos were shown during worship and will continue until November 13, 2022.

The installation of our new pastor will be on January 7, 2023.

The committee will begin to work on the budget for 2023 and will ask committees to provide us with their budgetary needs for 2023.

Laurie shared that on November 9th in the evening, we will be having a celebration recognizing the individuals who have been assisting St. Mark's during our call process.

The meeting adjourned at 7:30 pm.

In the first days and years of Christianity, all Christians were often called saints (see 1 Corinthians 1:2, NRSV). As time went on, certain Christians who lived holy and sanctified lives became special examples of truly living "above the crowd" in their dedication and service on God's behalf. As other Christians recognized these very pious souls, the Roman Catholic Church began to cherish them as true saints, commendable as examples to be remembered and appreciated. It was and is still the Pope who, after a thorough examination of the life of the holy person under consideration, can officially designate the person as a saint.

We as Lutherans, following the New Testament, consider all Christians as saints. Yet those very unique Christians who have exhibited great commitment to Christ in special ways are often hailed as being saintly, especially after death. On All Saints' Day, all Christians should remember those who have faithfully passed the torch of faith and service to Christ's followers. A special service of worship is fitting.

On the first Sunday in November, November 6th, we will observe All Saints' Sunday here at St. Mark's. There will be a special time of remembrance during the service where all those who have gone to their heavenly home will be remembered. Friends and family members of those being remembered will be invited to come forward and light a candle in their honor. #### Craft Sale was a HUGE Success!


