His preference for being close to nature through barefoot walks reflected a deep connection with the environment. Youth leader Matt's involvement brought youthful energy and relatability to the camp. Matt's presence fostered a sense of friendship and peer support among the campers. I met his little son, who is quite talkative, and has an interesting imagination.

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
JT, Braydin, and I would like to go to the camp next year, and I pray that more youth will attend. Thank you for raising money so that the youth can have this amazing experience.

Call to order: Meeting was called to order at 6:30 pm.

Devotions: Jenny shared a devotion. Pastor will share devotions in July.

Approval of minutes: Minutes from May 18, 2023. MSC to approve Jason Blank/Pennie Linna

Thank yous: Pat Westphal, Judy Hellman, and the worship and music ministry team for all the work on gathering information on the Clavinova and Organ. Ellen LaMarche for her financial donation to install digital sign.

Financial Report: Mary Jane summarized the financials. We are under budget at this time. Giving for May was less than May expenses. Summer typically trends toward less giving. Overall, we are still ahead. **MSC to approve the May financial report Sherri Denney/Pennie Linna**

Pastor's Report:

- 1. Saturday, June 3, 2023. St. Mark's and Islamic Center ecumenical potluck. It was very successful. We learned about Islam and enjoyed delicious food. We had 15 women and three men from St. Mark's attend.
- 2. Monday, June 5, 2023, I attended the Property Ministry Team meeting to discuss the electronic sign that Ellen donated.
- 3. Tuesday, June 6, 2023, I attended St. Mark's Racial Equity Team meeting. We are planning to introduce the congregation to different events about Native Americans, which include visiting Oneida Nation Museum (DePere) and the Pow-Wow in Neenah in September.
- 4. Saturday, June 10, 2023, I officiated Sonny Koerner's memorial service.
- 5. Sunday, June 11-Tuesday 13, 2023, I attended the Wisconsin Missional Leadership Cohort workshop at Green Lake conference center. The next meeting will be in October 2023.
- 6. Wednesday, June 14, 2023, I started to teach a class about Lutheranism to new church members—Emily and Dominic.
- 7. Thursday, June 15, 2023, I met with my Neenah colleagues to talk about the joint worship service at Riverside Park on September 3, 2023.
- 8. Sunday, June 18, until Friday, June 23, 2023, I will be attending the confirmation camp at Pine Lake next week. There is no pastor to cover for me. So, I will come back in case of an emergency.
- 9. One of the members of St. Mark's family will soon have surgery and asked me to find a host to take care of her for five days after her surgery. I could not find anyone. I called the pastor from her home church, who has the same struggle. She contacted a rehab place to see if they could help her. She is waiting to hear from them. Her friend offered her a chance to stay a few days at her apartment in Appleton, so that is one choice. Also, what might work out is the initial 3-day stay at a local rehab place and then move to her friend's apartment. She does not have money to pay for three to five days. The Worship and Music Ministry Team met on Monday, June 12th. Members present were Pat Westphal, Lois Hill, Joy and Jenny Case, Ardys Seelow, Betty Linna and Judy Hellman.

Devotions were given by Lois Hill. Joy Case volunteered for devotions in July.

Candy bars will be given to all adult men on Father's Day. Joy Case and Mary Ellen Tracey will hand them out. Special music for the summer was discussed. At the present time, four different people have shown interest in performing.

There will be a hymn-sing on the 4th Sunday in June. Judy Hellman will be playing that day. Pat Westphal will coordinate the hymn-sing.

Our clavinova committee gave an update report on the organ/ clavinova issue. At the present time, no organ repair person has been found. After visiting Heid Music, we felt that the Model 809 clavinova would be a very suitable unit for our church. It has 12 different organ stops as well as many other instruments. We were given a very reasonable price quote for this unit, which is about \$55,000 cheaper than an organ.

A donation of \$6,000 has been given to replace some of our paraments. We plan to purchase 3-piece altar sets in red, purple and green. We will also purchase a white veil and burse. We will be searching for reasonable prices for these items. We decided several colors could just be dry-cleaned.

Finance and Stewardship Ministry Team – June 13, 2023 ~ *submitted by Laurie Olson*

Members Present: Treasurer Mary Jane Hartley, Pennie Linna, Financial Secretary Pat Westphal and Laurie Olson Members Absent: Pastor Niveen, Jean Memken, and Evie Peterson

Opened with a Prayer.

Reviewed current account balances through end of May 2023. May's giving was \$13,230.99 and expenses were \$15,780.20. Difference was (\$2,549.21).

Total Associated Bank checking has a balance of \$178,523.85 which includes \$56,805.30 allocated to designated accounts and \$121,178.55 for current operating. Additionally, there is \$154,650.43 in the Thrivent money market and \$1,020.28 in Thrivent TIPS account and \$53,848.32 in the ELCA Mission Investment Fund.

After reviewing account balances, the Stewardship & Finance Ministry Team asked Mary Jane to move all dollars in the YOUTH COG & YOUTH TUUG accounts into the YOUTH ACTIVITIES account. It was noted that that COG & TUUG have not been active groups for many years.

A brief discussion took place regarding Laurie Olson stepping down from the church council and replacing Mary Jane Hartley as Treasurer, effective September 1, 2023. This request will be taken to the council on Thursday, June 15, 2023 for their approval.

Our bank, Associated Bank, informed us that there would be a charge for these booklets, somewhere near \$100. It was decided to go with the free deposit slips that require us to hand write our account number and name on the slips. Additionally, we will make photo copies of the slips to be used, by the counters, as duplicates and attached to the giving envelopes. Pat will write up a notice for the counters.

Discussed funding for those wishing to attend camp this summer, such as the Grandparents' Camp at Crossways. The Bible Camper fund has limited dollars and would not be able to fund requests. It was suggested that an Endowment Grant be written to cover these potential costs.

Laurie reported that a request to assist an individual with medical expenses has come to the church's attention. After a discussion, it was decided to ask the council to approve a call for funds for the *Helping Hands* program, since there currently is zero funds in this account. This program was developed last year as a process to provide financial aid to an individual who is in need on an urgent basis. There is an application for the requestor to complete and is overseen by the Social Ministry Team. Laurie said she had talked with Karen Jordan, from the Social Ministry Team, and she agreed with this plan.

A discussion on establishing an email for the Financial Secretary took place. The email address could be a way for Pat to publish and receive emails from members, regarding their financial statements. It was decided to ask Jean to set up a mailbox for Pat in the narthex to receive communication. Also, Pat will put a note in the newsletter letting members know that if they have a question, regarding their giving, they can put a note in her mailbox or call office and ask her to contact them.

Pat asked if we could consider emailing quarterly giving statements to those who have provided email addresses, to save time and money. End-of-the-year statements would be hardcopies. Our donations program, Church Windows, has this option. The Stewardship & Finance Team discussed this idea. Pat and Laurie will work on putting together a note, to be included with the 2nd qtr. statements asking members if they would like to receive 1st, 2nd and 3rd quarterly statements via email, for those with email addresses. They can also verify their email addresses at that time.

We closed the meeting at 7:40 pm with the Lord's Prayer.

- 1.Update on Digital Sign: Jason talked to the congregation about the process of the sign donation and a board with the selection design is on display in Fellowship Hall.
- 2.Small Group Gatherings: All groups have been invited and moderators have been assigned. The group gatherings are part of the Ministry Site Profile's Mutual Expectations.
- 3. Vacation Bible School: Representatives from all churches met. We are hosting at St Mark's.

New Business Items

Organ/Clavinova Presentation: Pat and Judy came to share information about the organ. Our current organ is a digital organ built in 1975. This is pre-computer chip. The initial cost of looking at the organ is \$500-\$800. A Clavinova to meet our needs is estimated at \$10,334. We need set-up and speaker update, which brings the total cost estimate to \$13,000. The Clavinova has the capacity to layer music sounds of a variety of instruments. The Clavinova can be played and recorded within the instrument. Pat Westfall is willing to contribute to pay up to \$1,000.00 to bring in Mark Snyder for repairs. The council has recommended education for the congregation on what a Clavinova is and the sounds it produces.

Helping Hands Request: Social Ministry reviews and grants requests. We have a current need for a friend of the congregation and the fund has been depleted. We will talk to the congregation and ask for funds to replenish funds. MSC to talk to the congregation to replenish funds Dawn Jones/Pennie Linna.

Ministry Team Covenant: A covenant was shared with the council. This is to be shared in meetings to lay ground rules for productive communication at meetings.

MSC to approve covenant to be shared at ministry team meetings Sherri Denney/Jason Blank.

Treasurer Position: Mary Jane has been dong this job for many years. Mary Jane is stepping down at this time and asking for volunteers to take her place. Thank you Mary Jane for all your hard work. **MSC to accept Mary Jane's resignation/retirement Sherri Denney/Kim Wallmuller.**

Laurie's resignation from council. Laurie is resigning her position to cover the Treasurer position, until a replacement can be found. Start date September 1, 2023. MSC to accept Laurie's council resignation Sherri Denney/Kim Wallmuller.

Pennie has agreed to step up to the position of council president. She is currently the vice president. MSC by Sherri Denney/Pastor Niveen to approve Pennie Linna to complete the term of president (Sept. till 2024 annual meeting).

Based on the St. Mark's constitution, we do not need to fill the vacant council position at this time. We will still have needed voting council members, to satisfy the numbers specified in the constitution. Discussion of pros and cons was shared. This can be addressed again in February.

MSC to nominate Jason as Vice President from September 1 to the 2024 annual meeting with the understanding that Jason will not automatically become president Ryan Blank/Sherri Denney.

Adjourn: MSC to adjourn Pennie Linna/Sherri Denney.



Good News from the Worship & Music Ministry Team



We have found someone to service our electronic organ!!! On June 20th, the serviceman spent hours with our Allen organ. Felts were replaced; keys adjusted as possible; electronic boards checked; audio contacts cleared of corrosion. His verdict is that it is in good condition. It needs to be serviced more frequently (every 2-3 years). (Ask Laurie about the dust in it.) However, we need to keep in mind that if anything significant fails with the electronic boards, they cannot be repaired or replaced as they are no longer available. He also remarked that if the speakers do not have cracks, they are good-to-go for the immediate future. Thanks to Laurie Olson and Ginny Schieck for climbing the ladder and removing the "fronts" to check out the speakers. The serviceman confirmed that they "look great." Our organ will sound much improved when it is next played which will likely be the end of July. This is a prayer answered. (We do need organists to play. Anyone have any suggestions?)

The news about the current piano (Clavinova®) is not as positive. Although the repairman does service Clavinovas, if this was his church, he would put the high cost of repair toward purchasing a new one. The Worship & Music Ministry Team will be presenting further information in a group setting during fellowship for those interested in hearing more. This presentation will occur the 23rd of July when we hope to kick off our fund-raising.

Finally, the always present question of costs. Although, the organ repair costs were not in the budget, they were covered by a benefactor. A donation fund for a new Clavinova® has been created. More information about contributing will be presented at the July 23rd meeting and in the Sunday bulletins going forward.—*Pat Westphal*

L ast month, a group from St. Mark's spent a wonderful evening sharing fellowship and food with the members of the Fox Valley Islamic Society. Currently, this group gathers throughout the week in a small building on Kappell Drive in Neenah. However, they are in the process of building a mosque on Marathon Avenue, not far from their current home, and they gave us a tour of their new facilities which are quite impressive.

One of the first interesting things to note about the current Islamic worship center is that there are separate entryways for the men and women. I was the first one of our group to get there, and one of the men directed me to take my food for the potluck to the basement. He pointed to the closest door which **was the men's entrance so I went in that way and took my food to the basement where they have** kitchen facilities and tables for dining. I went back out the way I came in, but after that, I noticed the **"Men" and "Women" signs on the doors, and made sure I entered through the women's door for the** rest of the evening.

Our evening started with a short worship service. For this, the men and women are separated into two different rooms. The women gathered in a side room while the men worshipped in the main room from which the worship leader conducted the service. When the service started, the women members of the society gathered in a line at the front of our room and stood throughout the service. At appointed times during the service, they would kneel and then press their faces to the floor, and then stand again. The service was in Arabic, so we could not understand it, and most of it was chanted. It was not a long service, only about 15 minutes. The women who participated were dressed very modestly, some with long flowing dresses and they all wore the traditional hijabs covering their hair and neckline. As female visitors, we were asked to cover our heads as well, and everyone who entered the rooms for worship had to remove their shoes. There were racks to hold the shoes right by the door.

After the service was over, we made our way to the construction site of the new mosque where many other members of the Islamic Society were gathered to go on the tour of the facilities with us. The new mosque is more than twice as big as their current gathering place, and has an impressive façade with the traditional four onion-domed minarets at each corner of the building. The worship area is a large open room in the center of the building. It has a big balcony, and they explained the men would worship on the ground floor and the women in the balcony. This allows for the separation of the genders, but the

women will now be able to actually see the worship leaders which will be nice. There are also rooms on the main level for offices, meeting spaces, and restrooms with foot washing facilities. Although the building is not completed, it will definitely be an impressive and comfortable place of worship when it is finished.

After the tour and group pictures, we headed back to the current Islamic Center where even more members of the Islamic Society had gathered and we once again went to our separate rooms, taking our shoes off and the women covering their heads. Leaders of the Islamic Society gave a short presentation on **the five pillars of Islam and the six main beliefs of the religion.** Although I couldn't see the speakers, I found their presentation very interesting. After they finished, they invited Pastor Niveen to speak, and she stood at the front of the room where the women gathered. In all, that was a very enlightening part of the evening.

Then it was time to eat! While we were touring the mosque, those that stayed behind set out all the food so when we returned we could eat. Once again, the sexes were separated with the men eating on the main level of the building and the women in the basement. There were a lot of women, so the whole basement was full and noisy with lots of conversation. The food was amazing – many new and tasty **Middle Eastern and African dishes as well as some familiar foods that our St. Mark's members brought.** In addition, there was take-out pizza, which really surprised me, but it was a popular choice, especially for the children that were there. There was such an abundance of food, that after the meal was over, they brought out carry out plates and each woman filled one plate up with food to take home. I thought that was a very nice tradition.

It was really wonderful to meet and get to know our Islamic neighbors here in Neenah. They were such gracious hosts and hostesses, and I think we found many ways that we were alike rather than different. I was talking to one of the women of their society and I said she would have to come and visit us at St. **Mark's and she seemed very excited at the prospect of getting together again.** I hope that we can return their hospitality sometime in the future. 


VBS Needs You!

Forge is the second book in the trilogy by Laura Halse Anderson centering on the lives of two slave children during the American Revolution. This book is chronicles the story of Curzon Smith, a runaway, who enlists in the Colonial Army after he and Isabel (the main character in *Chains*) have become separated. Curzon comes across a skirmish on the outskirts of Valley Forge and after rescuing Ebenezeer **Woodruff from being killed by a redcoat, Curzon is introduced to Eben's** uncle, Caleb, and joins the American army. A vivid description of the

terrible New England cold, the lack of food and other provisions, the construction of **huts, marching in bare feet...all in the brutal cold of a New England winter make for** a memorable read. Bigotry and intolerance are also present in the camp. When Caleb mistakenly cleaves his ankle while chopping down trees for the huts, a bigot named Burns and his goons attack Curzon and steal his boots during the night. When a blizzard strikes the camp, it brings along with it members of the Continental **Congress, Curzon's former slaveowner, Bellingham, Isabel (from the first book), and** a new wrinkle in the slave servant, Gideon. The story is filled with adventure, **appalling descriptions of participation in Washington's army, and is vividly told. You** will find *Forge* on the Racial Equity book cart by the kitchen door in the narthex. A great summer read with a level for middle school readers. *— Pat Westphal*
