In this article, I will continue to summarize the exciting book, *The Great Dechurching: Who's Leaving, Why Are They Going, and What Will It Take to Bring Them Back? by* Jim Davis, Michael Graham, and Ryan P. Burge. I gave you a summary last month of the whole book. In this article, I will talk about Cultural Christians.

Who are the cultural Christians? According to the authors, cultural Christians are still believers, but they left the church for different reasons, that is, dechurched (pg. 42). <u>"Dechurch" means leaving the</u> church altogether.

Cultural Christians often leave the church during their college or early professional years. Why did they leave? See the figure on the left (pg. 49).

In chapter four, the authors focused on the culturally dechurched Christians in Mainstream Evangelicals (DMEs). They found in their survey that they "are slightly younger than churched mainstream


evangelicals (CMEs), with an average age of 40 compared to age 50 among those still churched" (pg. 57).

According to the survey, the dechurched are, on average, 40 years old, and dropped out of the church during the COVID-19 pandemic. Data shows that 61% of this group is female with higher incomes and education levels. (pg. 60-61).

In chapter five, the authors discuss the Exvangelicals (exit evangelicals).

People who fit this profile comprise 17 percent of dechurched evangelicals in the survey. They have purposefully left evangelicalism and no intention to return (pg. 68-69). However, 70% of them affirm the orthodox faith—

believing in the doctrine laid out in the Nicene Creed (pg. 71) and are willing to return to different church traditions, but not evangelical. The authors describe them as dechurched casualties because they experienced trauma at church. "According to the study, exvangelicals are 82 percent white, 13 percent Black, and 2 percent Hispanic" (pg. 69). Their political affiliation is center-left, and they primarily trust broadcast news (pg. 70). "Exvangelicals have particularly low confidence in the public education system (27%), criminal justice system (25%), big technology companies (22%), US Congress (20%), newspapers (18%), and Wall Street (16%)" (pg. 73) Exvangelicals also struggle with the political partisanship found in many evangelical churches today. What do they need? The survey found that the exvangelicals need a nonpartisan and healthy church community consistent in their ethics (pg. 75).

Pastor's Ponderings

In chapter six, the authors discuss the BIPOC, which stands for "Black, indigenous, and people of color." This group is 100 percent non-white (pg. 84). The data found that the dechurched BIPOC are highly educated, affluent, and relatively unorthodox (pg. 88-89). The group is 68% male and 32% female (pg. 85). The survey found that they slightly support Christian nationalism, 55% support Trump, 57% support the January 6 riot, 52% support Russia's military operation in Ukraine" (pg. 87).

They reported leaving the church around age (13–17) or (18–25) because of their school or profession. Unfortunately, parents play a more negative role in the dechurched BIPOC's decision to dechurch. The figure to the right explains the reasons (p. 92).

The reason for the dechurched BIPOC to return to church is related to a strong and established relationship with friends and loved ones (pg. 94). They need a church that is willing to put political partisanship aside and build a healthy relationship with them (pg. 95).



In chapter seven, the authors discuss the Dechurched Mainline and Catholic. The authors found remarkable similarities between dechurched mainline Protestants and Catholics. The data found that gender was the most significant difference between the two groups—48% dechurched Catholic females compared to 68% dechurched mainline females (pg. 104). Politically speaking, the data found that the Catholics were less supportive of Donald Trump than the mainline dechurched (pg. 105). "Dechurched Catholics were more likely to cite political friction, misogyny, and desiring more sexual freedom as reasons why they dechurched than the dechurched mainline group (Ibid).

The data also found that 15% of the mainline believe that the Bible is the literal word of God compared to 13% of Catholics (pg.106). Many of both groups are against "Christian nationalism, Donald Trump, the Capitol riots of January 6, 2021, racism, and misogyny." Only 21% of these groups favor Fox News and 13 % CNN (pg. 107). The reasons for these two groups leaving the church are related to politics, belief, lack of time, and life change. The dechurched mainliners and Catholics state that they would be willing to return to the church if the church is willing to do real good work in the community. The authors explain that it is difficult to minister to this group. It requires years of consistent and patient relationships to bring them back to church (114).



Dear Church Council Members,

Grace and peace to you.

I want to share with you a summary of my recent pastoral activities and engagements:

1. **August 13 & 20:** I had the privilege of attending two meetings with ELCA pastors and our St. Mark's youth and family members to discuss the upcoming youth gathering in New Orleans next summer. It was an opportunity for us to plan and coordinate for this exciting event.

2. **September 3:** We had a joint service with the ELCA Neenah churches, and I am delighted to report that 45 worshipers from St. Mark's joined in. The feedback from this gathering was truly heartwarming and encouraging.

3. **September 10:** I was honored to preside over Cullen Odekirk's baptism. I met with his parents and godparents to discuss the significance of this sacrament and their spiritual and physical responsibility toward Cullen.

4. **September 7:** I had a meaningful discussion on "A Declaration of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America To American Indian And Alaska Native People." Pat Westphal led this discussion on Sunday, Sept. 10.

5. **September 11:** I participated in the last Missional Leaders coaching session, which was a valuable opportunity for personal and professional growth.

6. **September 12:** I attended colleagues' meeting to discuss the youth gathering planned for next summer. The deadline for submitting participant names is October 14, and I'm pleased to report that two boys and one volunteer from our congregation have expressed interest. Our Savior Lutheran Church will handle the registration process. Additionally, we discussed the Thanksgiving worship service that will take place at St. Mark's.

7. **September 14:** I attended the Appleton Conference Meeting held at St. Paul. I also showed the ELCA documentary "Native Nations: Standing Together for Civil Rights." This documentary shows how our church, the ELCA,

accompanies our Native American siblings to pursue justice and equality. After watching the documentary, we engaged in meaningful discussion on how Saint Mark's can move forward in understanding and building relationships with our Native American siblings.

Opened with a Prayer.

Reviewed current account balances through end of August 2023. August's giving was \$10,932.70 and expenses were \$13,825.29. Difference was -\$2,892.59.

Total Associated Bank checking has a balance of \$186,193.27 which includes \$69,292.64 allocated to designated accounts and \$116,900.63 for current operating. Additionally, \$156,462.58 in the Thrivent money market and \$1,039.52 in Thrivent TIPS account and \$54,261.65 in the ELCA Mission Investment Fund. Year-to-date for current operating: Giving = \$113,303.87 and Expenses=\$110,656.73. Difference=\$2,647.14.

It was again noted that the SCRIP program procedures for handling the payments and allocation of those dollars continue to be reviewed. Some past accounting errors have resulted in numerous journal entry corrections in both the revenue and expense side of SCRIP.

Mary Jane and Laurie will be meeting with Associated Bank and Thrivent to change authorizations credentials for accessing accounts.

Third quarter statements will go out in early October.

The Ministry Team continued with a discussion of 2023 Stewardship program; Down, In, & Out.

Reviewed Stewardship Campaign letter. It was noted that Fern's name was listed and Pennie noted that she revised the theme graphic into a cross. Pennie will send Laurie the graphic, so she can update the letter.



Non-Fiction—The Lemon Tree by Sandy Tolan


This is one of many books on our book cart.
