When Salvation Through Faith is Not Enough

Dear children of God gathered as St. Mark's Lutheran Church,

"Grace be with you all" (1 Timothy 6:21).

As we observe Mental Health Awareness Month in May, I reflect on a sermon I once heard from an ELCA pastor. They proclaimed, "If we are in a good relationship with God, we will not be depressed." This statement struck me



profoundly and made me reevaluate my relationship with God in Jesus. I was going through a tough time and transition in my life. Away from my family, friends, and familiar surroundings, I found myself in a new town in California for my internship, grappling with the weight of isolation and uncertainty. Financial constraints made seeking professional help seem out of reach. Hearing this pastor's statement made me feel that I am not in a good relationship with God, and so I need to be closer to God to free myself from anxiety. Through prayers and meditation, my cortisol dropped. However, the grip of anxiety persisted, impacting both my emotional well-being and physical health.

With the stability of a steady income, I sought medical support, finally accessing the prescription and counseling I so desperately needed. Anti-anxiety medication and therapy have helped me. It was a transformative journey, one that taught me a valuable lesson: while faith is a cornerstone of my life, it does not negate the importance of medical intervention in addressing mental health challenges. In other words, "salvation is by grace through faith" (Ephesians 2:8-9), but salvation from anxiety and depression cannot be by faith alone. God provides us with medicine, psychiatry, and psychology therapy to use.

Studies show that pastors experience higher levels of mental and emotional distress than the general population, with elevated rates of depression, anxiety, burnout, and even suicidal thoughts reported across different surveys. My own experiences in ministry only served to underscore this reality, especially amidst the added strain of the COVID-19 pandemic. The mental well-being of pastors impacts not just themselves but also their congregation.

Recently, during a meeting with our executive ministry team, I was encouraged to adopt a healthier work-life balance, a gesture of genuine concern for my well-being. Embracing their guidance, I have committed to taking regular two days off. So, I will try diligently to make Fridays and Saturdays personal time to relax and rejuvenate. Additionally, I plan to allocate Wednesdays for sermon preparation instead of Fridays.

I want to express openly that I take anxiety medication every day and regularly see a therapist. Mental and emotional illness should not remain a stigma. Jesus experienced deep sorrow, Paul grappled with inner conflict, and the Psalms often articulate profound feelings of sorrow, angst, and fear.

Overcoming mental health condition requires more than prayer alone; it demands active faith. Mental illness is not a sign of a lack of faith or a consequence of sins. Just like physical illness, mental and emotional health challenges require professional care.

Finally, God calls the church to practice accompaniment, journeying alongside and fully engaging with all who suffer, including individuals facing mental health challenges. In doing so, we affirm the sacred truth that healing encompasses both the body and the mind.

Financial Report: Laurie reviewed current account balances through the end of March 2024. March's giving to current monthly expenses was \$18,247.05 and actual expenses were \$16,560.91.

The difference was \$1,686.14. Year to date (end of March) giving was \$44,526.90 and expenses were \$39,899.36 with a difference (giving minus spending) of \$4,627.54.

Total Associated Bank checking has a balance of \$187,970.05 which includes \$72,662.85 allocated to designated accounts and \$115,307.20 for current operating. Additionally, \$162,426.68 in the Thrivent money market and \$1,023.85 in Thrivent TIPS account and \$55,544.29 in the ELCA Mission Investment Fund. **MSC Jason Blank/Dawn Jones to accept the Financial Report.**

As we reflect on the events of March and April, we are filled with gratitude for the abundant presence of the Holy Spirit in our church community. Throughout Palm Sunday, Holy Week, and Easter, we experienced moments of profound spiritual connection and fellowship.

Outdoor yard sign policy: A member had a question about yard signs posted by the doors. It was noted that signs up for extended periods lose their effectiveness - message is lost. After a discussion, the council provided guidelines for the office to use, when asked to put up a yard sign and for duration of the sign posting. **MSC to approve the policy Dawn Jones/Jason Blank.**

Guidelines include:

Sign approval authority will be given to Pastor and office staff.

Ensure sign is from an organization we support and are affiliated with, such as ELCA. ECSW, ESTHER, etc. If the sign is for a specific event (date/time), the sign needs to be removed after the event has been held.

General Signs e.g. support of a cause/agency (no event): sign can be up for 60 days maximum and must then be taken down. Another sign, from the same agency, can go back up after 30 days from the day taken down and it is suggested the message be different from previous sign.

Limited to one sign per organization.

It is the responsibility of the individual who put up the sign to take it down. If this doesn't happen, church staff will remove the sign.

Synod Assembly Service Project: The synod assembly service project will be supporting Crossways Camping Ministries. Each conference (ours is the Appleton Conference) has a different list of in-kind items to purchase, can donate dollars directed to the Crossways Scholarship Fund or give of time at the synod service project table. There is a QR code link to Amazon for a purchase list. After discussion, it was decided to allow our congregation the option to purchase directly through Amazon or include dollars in an envelope (like how we collected money for the Clavinova) and the treasurer will make a purchase from the given list. Laurie will collaborate with Jean to get the provided bulletin insert and envelope in our bulletins. **MSC to approve the support of the Synod assembly service project Laurie Olson/Jenny Case.**

MAY 5 is National Day of Awareness for Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women and Girls

A National Day of Awareness for Missing and Murdered Native Women and Girls:

- honors the lives of our Native sisters,
- continues to shed light on the countless tragedies involving our Native sisters,
- highlights the need for ongoing grassroots advocacy and organizing for change of laws, policies, protocols, and allocation of increased resources at the tribal, federal, and state levels to end these injustices, and
- creates the sharing of information needed to understand the legal reforms and changes required.

The current reports of abduction and murder of Native women are alarming and represent one of the most horrific aspects of the spectrum of violence committed against Native women. The murder rate of Native women is more

than ten times the national average on some reservations. These disappearances or murders are often connected to domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, stalking, and sex trafficking. It is important to understand the connection between domestic, dating, and sexual violence and the high incidence of missing and murdered Indigenous women (MMIW) in the United States.

In response to the crisis of MMIW, grassroots actions to honor and call for justice for missing and murdered Indigenous women have increasingly grown at the local, regional, national, and international levels. Many of these grassroots efforts have lifted May 5th as a National Day of Awareness for Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women and Girls. May 5th is the birthday of 21-year-old Hanna Harris (*Northern Cheyenne*) who went missing and was found murdered on the Northern Cheyenne Reservation in 2013. Since then, Native families, advocates, and Indigenous nations have risen to challenge the silence, tolerance, and inaction in response to the crisis of MMIW. Locally, community searches and actions, tribal press conferences, justice marches continue to draw attention and urgency to the MMIW crisis, reflecting the long-standing call-in holding governments publicly accountable for the perpetrators allowed to prey on Native women with impunity.

Millions of people in the U.S., many of whom are our neighbors, friends, and family, lack the blessing to access to primary healthcare. This includes those

who are uninsured, underinsured, facing language barriers, geographical barriers, cultural barriers, and lack of availability of quality healthcare services. Founded in 2015 and located within the Goodwill Headquarters for NE Wisconsin in Menasha, Hope Clinic and Care Center (HCC) partners with the surrounding communities to provide collaborative wraparound support to over 700 patients annually, each of whom are living at or below 300% of the Federal Poverty Level. The clinic offers primary care, specialty care, labs, medications, counseling, and social assistance referrals and navigation to rent support, utilities, dental, vision, job placement and training, and more.



By addressing the immediate healthcare needs of patients, Hope Clinic helps to break the cycle of poor health and limited access to care and improves the health and quality of life for those who might otherwise go without care. Through meticulous effort, we hope to make a positive impact on the health and well-being of the communities it serves and works to create a more equitable and just future.
