The Holy Resurrection Monastery in St. Nazianz, WI

Dear Children of God gathered as St. Mark's Lutheran Church, Grace and peace to you.

I would like to share my experience from a spiritual retreat at Holy Resurrection Monastery in St. Nazianz, WI, held from August 5-7, 2024. The monastery, part of the Eastern Romanian Catholic Church, embodies a rhythm rooted in Byzantine Orthodox tradition and Eastern Catholic monasticism. Its daily life integrates prayer, work, and communal living, reflecting a deep commitment to spiritual and communal values.



Daily Life at the Monastery



A distinctive feature of the retreat was observing the call to prayer using a semantron—a wooden board struck with a hammer—before each service. This ancient practice, developed during the Ottoman Empire's restrictions on church bells, reflects the monks' historical heritage. The semantron summons the community to worship, with the first service of the day beginning at 6:00 am.

After morning worship, the monks sit silently for breakfast at 8:00 am, followed by personal time in their cells from 8:30 to 9:00 am. This period of solitude allows them to reflect and prepare for the day's duties. The monks then engage in their "morning obedience," attending to their daily responsibilities around and out of the monastery.

The community assembles again for worship at noon, followed by lunch at 12:30 pm. The afternoon is dedicated to further "obediences," including rest, reading, or other tasks. The following service occurs at 4:50 pm, leading into the evening meal at 6:15 pm, during which readings from the church fathers are shared, enriching the meal with spiritual nourishment.







The final service of the day is held at 8:00 pm, after which the monastery observes a period of silence and private prayer. This time allows for personal reflection and communion with God before retiring for the night.

Experiencing Worship and Ecumenical Dialogue:

Participating in worship at the monastery was a profound experience, immersing me in the rich tapestry of Byzantine liturgy and monastic devotion. The day's structure, from the solemn morning services to the reflective evening prayers, provided a deep sense of peace and connection to the spiritual traditions that guide the monks' lives.

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Engaging in ecumenical conversations with the monks was equally enriching. Their openness and willingness to share insights into their traditions fostered a meaningful dialogue. These conversations highlighted the commonalities and distinctions between our practices, deepening my understanding of the Eastern Catholic tradition.

Hospitality at the Monastery:

The hospitality at Holy Resurrection Monastery is a natural extension of their spiritual life. The monks warmly welcome individuals and groups seeking retreat and reflection. The guesthouse, open to everyone, offers a serene environment for those looking to experience the monastic life or find a place for quiet contemplation. Their approach to hospitality is infused with the same reverence and care that characterizes their daily prayers and work, making every guest feel valued and spiritually nurtured.



My time at the monastery was characterized by a deep sense of spiritual enrichment and a warm, welcoming atmosphere that embodied the essence of their monastic mission. I pray that the Lord bestows upon His Church wisdom and understanding to collaborate in advancing His kingdom on earth. Amen.



I am delighted to provide a report on two recent significant events: the retreat at Holy Resurrection Monastery and our Vacation Bible School (VBS) at St. Paul Lutheran Church.

Retreat at Holy Resurrection Monastery

From August 1-3, 2024, I had the privilege of attending a retreat at Holy Resurrection Monastery in St. Nazianz, WI.

This Byzantine Catholic monastery, in union with Rome, offered a sacred space for deep reflection and spiritual renewal. The retreat included five services each day, providing a profound opportunity for prayer and meditation.

During this time, I was able to focus on preparing my sermon and Bible study without the usual distractions of daily ministry. The quiet and contemplative environment at the monastery enriched my spiritual preparation and strengthened my resolve for upcoming pastoral duties.

Vacation Bible School (VBS) at St. Paul Lutheran Church

Following the retreat, from August 5-8, 2024, St. Paul Lutheran Church hosted a vibrant VBS with the theme, "Whenever I'm afraid, I put my trust in you" (Psalm 56:3). This event was a wonderful continuation of the spiritual growth fostered at the retreat, though in a more energetic and engaging setting.

We welcomed 50 children and 40 volunteers who contributed their time and talents to make this VBS a memorable experience. The children explored the theme through music, drama, storytelling, games, arts and crafts, science

experiments, and snacks. Each activity was designed to help them understand and trust in God more deeply.

The enthusiasm and joy of the children, combined with the dedication of our volunteers, created a nurturing and dynamic environment where faith was both taught and celebrated.





Conclusion

Both events, though different in nature, complemented each other in enriching my spiritual life. The retreat provided a time of personal renewal and preparation, while the VBS offered an opportunity to impart faith to the next generation in a vibrant, interactive way.

It was noted that St. Mark's has 6 grave sites at Greenlawn Memorial Park, Neenah. These lots were donated to St. Mark's in 2000 by a member. Laurie has contacted Greenlawn to get additional information on the lots, such as value, process for transferring and/or selling the sites. There is no official documentation of these grave sites in the St. Mark's files. Greenlawn will do research and send us documents/deeds. This initial conversation with Greenlawn indicated that each lot is valued at \$1,449. We can transfer a lot to someone for a \$299.00 fee or sell at any amount. Laurie would like to get a process in place to transfer/and or sell these grave sites to St. Mark's members. She will take this to the council for further guidance.

The team members began reviewing a program for our annual Stewardship Drive. *The Generosity Project* was suggested by Pat. After a discussion, it was decided to go with this program for a cost of \$40 for unlimited digital access to materials. A special meeting has been set for August 27 at 6:30 pm to design a program to meet our needs, using *The Generosity Project* as our guide. Pat will email Jean the program file for printing. NOVEMBER 10 was set as STEWARDSHIP SUNDAY.

It was reported that the Racial Equity Team will be hosting a Fall Harvest Meal on Sunday, October 6 during fellowship. Members will be asked to bring a dish to pass using traditional fall foods. Parking Lot Report: The meeting to discuss fundraising with Finance & Stewardship and Property has been postponed to Monday, August 19. Discussions are occurring with a member on financial support for the project.

Chili Cook-Off Update: November 5, 2024. We will make the chili and bring to Our Saviors. This will be open to the community. This will be a fundraiser. Gwen, who is St. Mark's representative, is looking for individuals to assist with cooking, set-up, clean-up, etc. Interested individuals are to contact Gwen.

New Business Items:

Bible Camper Basket Raffle: Donna Joachim contacted Pennie and Laurie regarding the annual Bible Camper Basket Raffle. She noted that Christan Ed. and the Campers would like to again hold the Basket Raffle. Gwen and Donna would like the proceeds to be split between the Campers and Good Gifts. Sunday School Kids will be able to pick out items from the Good Gifts Catalog as they have done in the past. The raffle would be open to anyone in the congregation or ministry teams wishing to contribute. They are tentatively looking at having the drawing held Dec.15th following the Sunday School Christmas Program. MSC to accept the fundraiser Jason Blank/Dawn Jones.

Fall Harvest Meal: Racial Equity Ministry Team will be hosting on October 6, 2024: Potluck to highlight the harvest and God's bounty.

Greenlawn Memorial Park: six gravesites were donated to the church in 2000 by Bertha Wensel. The value is \$1,449 each. This cost is for the sites only – no burial fees are included. Little official paperwork exists in the church files. Laurie has contacted Greenlawn Memorial Park for further information. They informed us that these grave sites can be given away or transferred to others. If transferred, there is a \$299 fee. Greenlawn is researching details on the grave sites and will get back to Laurie. After discussion, the council agreed the grave sites should be offered to St. Mark's members, at no cost unless individual(s) wishes to transfer the sites into their name. In that case, the transfer fee would be the responsibility of the individual(s). MSC to move forward with gifting sites contingent on official certificates from Greenlawn Memorial Park Jason Blank/Kim Wallmuller.

MSC to adjourn at 7:15 pm, ending with the Lord's Prayer Kim Wallmuller/Dawn Jones.

Pine Ridge Reconciliation Center

The Mission of the Month for September is the Pine Ridge Reconciliation Center which is part of the Lutheran Lakota Shared Ministries. They focus on four different ministry outreach areas.

The Threshold/Common Basket ministry includes everything that is distributed out their door including new quilts and blankets, diapers and wipes, morning coffee, mid-day sandwiches, hot meals, and hygiene kits. In the winter months, it also includes our energy assistance matching program.





Cultural immersions are visiting groups who come to learn about Lakota history and culture from the Lakota people. We strive to provide programming and presentations that foster mutual conversations and greater understanding of each other.

The Lutheran/Lakota Job Corp employs local people from the community of Pine Ridge to run and assist the ministries of the Reconciliation Center. This ministry provides people with a way to earn a living and support their families. They have added a mentoring element to the program for young adults.

Children and Youth—Currently, the Pine Ridge Reconciliation Center hosts a variety of youth programs for young children, preteens and teens.



Adult Forum News


