Hope in the Midst of Uncertainty

Last Wednesday, I was interviewed by the team behind the online website *Unbound: The Intersections of Faith and Justice*, which is affiliated with the Presbyterian Church. In my interview, I focused on understanding Advent in times of uncertainty. One of the key passages I discussed was Isaiah 9:2. I would like to share a summary of my interview with the hope and prayer that it brings hope and comfort to your life.

"The people who walked in darkness have seen a great light; those who lived in a land of deep darkness—on them light has shined" (Isaiah 9:2).

In times of uncertainty, it is easy to feel as though we are walking in darkness. Whether due to the weight of personal struggles, global unrest, or the unpredictable seasons of life, darkness can seem overwhelming. The people in Isaiah's time knew this all too well. They lived under the shadow of oppression, feeling lost and abandoned. Yet, Isaiah prophesied of a light that would shine into their darkness—a light that would bring hope, peace, and healing.

This prophecy was not just for the people of Isaiah's day; it speaks to us today, especially in this season of Advent. As we prepare for the coming of Christ, we are reminded that no matter how deep the darkness, the light of Christ shines brighter still. Jesus, the light of the world, entered into the messiness and uncertainty of human life to bring hope to all. His birth in Bethlehem marked the dawning of God's promise fulfilled—the promise that we are never alone in our struggles, and that light will always overcome darkness.

As we are in this season of Advent, we also anticipate that Jesus will intervene in our lives and allow His light to shine in the midst of our uncertainty. He is the One who guides us, comforting us in the darkness and leading us toward hope and peace. His light not only illuminates our path but also fills our hearts, transforming us and the world around us.

If you are facing uncertainty today, know that you are not walking alone. Christ, the light, is with you and your church is walking with you, too. As we wait in hope this Advent season, let us place our trust in the One who promises to guide us through the darkness. May we embrace the light of Christ, letting it fill our hearts with peace and lead us into a future full of hope.

Prayer:

God of light and hope, we thank You for sending Your Son, Jesus, into our world to shine in the darkness. In this season of Advent, help us to remember that no matter how uncertain our circumstances may be, Your light is with us. Guide us through the darkness and fill us with the hope of Jesus' second coming. Amen.

Final Resting Lots Available



Many years ago, St. Mark's was gifted six lots at *Greenlawn Memorial Park*, 1451 Green Valley Road, Neenah. The Church Council has decided to offer these to our congregation, at no cost. Each lot has a value of approximately \$1,400. A lot can accommodate a full burial or multi cremation burials. The cost of the burial process is not included in the noted value. All costs associated with the burial is the responsibility of the recipient of the lot. Priority will be given to St. Mark's member first and then open to others, for any available lots. The lots will be assigned to the interested individual and will not be transferable.

What do I do, if interested in a lot? St. Mark's members can contact the church office and give name and phone number by January 31, 2025.

How will I know if I will receive a lot? After January 31, 2025, if there is interest from six or less, you will receive a lot assignment. If more than six are interested, six names will be "drawn out of a hat".

What if I'm interested in a lot and not a member of St. Mark's? The church will announce if lots are available after the January 31, 2025 deadline. At that time, non-members can contact the church office with their interest. Lots will then be assigned on a first-come, first-serve basis.

Beginning Tuesday, December 3, 2024, the church office hours will be as follows:

Pastor Niveen's hours will remain the same.

Additionally, \$166,642.55 in the Thrivent money market and \$1,055.94 in Thrivent TIPS account and \$56,409.81 in the ELCA Mission Investment Fund. Increased designated account reflects parking lot replacement giving, including \$30,000 from Ellen LaMarche.

Adjourn: MSC to adjourn and share the Lord's Prayer at 7:35 by Emily Christofilis/Jenny Case.



Church Staff Members Attend Seminar

On November 21, Pastor Niveen, Pat Westphal, Laurie Olson and myself (pictured below) made our way down to Milwaukee to attend a seminar on Church Worker burnout. It was an enlightening morning with Amanda Sattler, a non-profit worker who actually suffered from burnout to the point that it has threatened her physical health and left her with chronic conditions she must live with daily. She explained what burnout actually is, and why it should be considered a medical condition and not just something people need to cope with on their own. She also highlighted the work of a couple of noted researchers in the area of employee burnout and explained what they discovered through their studies and the implications for employers and employees. The thing that struck me the most was who actually was more likely to suffer from employee burnout. Dr. Sattler reported that people in helping professions, primarily non-profits organizations (like churches), were much more likely to experience worker burnout than those employed in other fields. In addition, those who are most passionate about the work they are doing are more likely

to burnout than those who are not as committed to their profession. As I think of myself and those who attended this workshop with me, we all fall into those two categories - working for a church and being highly committed to our work. So it was good we were able to attend this session and consider how we can avoid becoming burned out on the job.

This seminar was put on by the Siebert Lutheran Foundation, and I was so glad they invited us to attend. There were many other church workers there as well as people who worked for non-profit organizations. It was free of charge and they included an electronic copy of the presentation notes and visuals the speaker prepared for the session, as well as a very nice lunch afterwards. In all, it was a wonderful day of personal growth and awareness of how to be a more effective worker for our Lord and for the members of St. Mark's.—*Jean Memken*



The Greatest Gift of All

If you are like me, you have probably started thinking about Christmas gifts. My e-mail mailbox is full of messages from various retail outlets, urging me to buy early and take advantage of "Pre-Black Friday" sales. My regular mailbox is stuffed with catalogs pressing me to buy everything from A to Z. You can wander through stores and see some of the most amazing items for sale during the holiday season: A set of Bluey dinnerware (Who is Bluey and why is he on everything from dinnerware to backpacks to Crocs?!), an eye massager, a blanket that looks like a tortilla wrap, and the list goes on. Whether we like it or not, Christmas has become a season of buying.

I'm sure all of you can remember a special gift that someone presented to you at Christmas or some other time. I will never forget the Christmas I got a doll that my grandparents gave me. My grandmother took the remnants of the fabric my mother had used to make my dresses, and fashioned it into dresses for the doll. It was like having a mini me with a magnificent wardrobe! I also remember the look on my kids' faces on Christmas morning when they opened the present they had been longing for all year, and there it was in front of them. Some gifts become treasures that last a lifetime.


Once such gift I received was a little book entitled "One Hundred Bible Stories." It was published by Concordia Publishing House in 1950, and my parents gave it to my brother and me when we were about 5 and 3 years old, respectively. At the time, it didn't seem like a very big present, but I grew to love that book. When my brother turned 6 and went to school and learned to print, he went through a possessive faze and proceeded to write his name in every book we shared. I was only four, so didn't know how to write anything except my name in capital letters, but I immediately took a pencil and scrawled my name in that book just to make sure he knew it was mine as well.

What made the book so special? At that age, I couldn't read, but on every other page, there was a picture. And what pictures they were-beautiful artwork depicting all the great Bible stories. I had just started Sunday School, and so was just learning about Jesus and all the stories in the Bible. And here was a book that had pictures of the people I was learning about! In my simple 4-year-old mind, I was amazed that I could learn about Noah and then go home, open the book, and see what he actually looked like, along with Moses, John the Baptist, and all the rest. I poured over that book and those pictures many times, and the book became very worn from my use of it. The "stories" were just portions of the Bible (King James Version), which I couldn't read, but I didn't have to. I knew those stories just from the pictures they had included in the book.

After my parents passed away and I was cleaning out their home, I found the book among many of the books my mother had kept (she was an English teacher and a great reader). I was overjoyed to think she had kept it for so many years. Now it was my children's turn to pore over those pictures. Sadly, when our family moved to Missouri, the book was mistakenly donated to our local library book sale, so it was gone for good, or so I thought. I discovered you really can find anything on the Internet, and I found a copy of that book, and promptly bought it. And even though it has someone else's name written in the front where I had once scrawled mine, I still think of it as a great treasure.

Although "One Hundred Bible Stories" didn't have the pizzazz of a lot of other Christmas gifts I have received over the years, it was essentially my first Bible – God's Word put into my hands at the tender age of three. I didn't realize it then, but now many Christmases later, I know that book was probably the *greatest gift* my parents ever gave me, and it led to my life with Christ, a gift that "keeps on giving" as the old ad slogan used to say.

As you prepare for Christmas, I hope you enjoy the shopping and the gift giving (and receiving!). But even more, I hope you remember a gift given to all of us long ago in a stable in Bethlehem. I hope you read the wonderful account of Jesus' birth written in Luke and think about the gift of God's Word, which keeps Christ close in our hearts each time we open a Bible. And I pray you have a Christmas full of memories of the truly greatest gift of all – Our Savior Jesus, come to earth to be the light in this dark world. New Advent 2024 Adult Forum starting December 1


