Why Do Bad Things Happen to People?



Dear Children of God gathered as St. Mark's,

This winter, I engaged the confirmation class in a heartfelt discussion on the sensitive and difficult question: *Why do bad things happen to people?* Our conversation was deep and meaningful, shaped not only by theological reflection but also by my own journey through seasons of suffering. I shared with them how I have accompanied my family through tragic losses—the death of my younger sister at age 27 from cancer, the passing of my father at 67, also from cancer, and now walking alongside my 39-year-old brother as he battles cancer.

This question—*Why do bad things happen?*—is not abstract for me. It is personal. And it is ancient.

To help me wrestle with it, I turned to the powerful book ***When Bad Things Happen to Good People*** by **Rabbi Harold S. Kushner**, first published in 1981. I have read it twice, and each time it offers wisdom, comfort, and honest wrestling. I highly encourage you to read it.

Despite its insights, I still find myself struggling with this question—just as many of you do. The confirmation class reminded me that this is a question that has united believers across time: from the writers of the Psalms and the book of Job to today's faithful who cry out, "How long, O Lord?"

Thanks be to God, we do not ask this question alone. Our faith does not always give us easy answers, but it offers us something more enduring: the assurance that we are not abandoned. God walks with us in our suffering. And this is what I hope to share with you: not a final answer, but a faithful way forward.

Why Do Bad Things Happen?

Many people today struggle with the concept of evil. Some prefer to avoid the word altogether, while others deny that evil even exists. Yet, a quick look at the news shows us that evil is a reality. If evil were not present in the world, life would be perfect.

But the truth is, bad things happen—despite humanity’s efforts to create a better world.

The Bible gives us insight into this question. In the book of *Genesis*, we learn that when Adam and Eve disobeyed God, sin entered the world and changed everything. Evil became part of the human experience, and its presence is a tragic reminder that something is broken in creation. The origin of evil, according to *Genesis 3*, helps us make sense of the world’s suffering. For those who reject this foundational story, evil remains a senseless mystery.

When sin entered the world, it disrupted all of creation. Sometimes, bad things happen simply because we live in a fallen world—a world groaning for redemption. Paul speaks of this longing in *Romans 8:18–25*, where he writes that creation itself waits eagerly for the day when Christ returns to make all things right.

It is important to understand, however, that while natural disasters and suffering occur because of the presence of sin, they are not always the result of a specific sin. It is spiritually harmful to claim that a tragedy is God’s punishment for a particular wrongdoing, unless God clearly reveals such a judgment in His Word. Otherwise, we must be careful not to assume or assign blame.

Sin affects every part of life. It leads to death, not only for people but also for animals and plants. We age, our bodies weaken, and we face decay. At times, evil comes directly from human choices—when people act selfishly, recklessly, or violently. While God offers forgiveness to all who repent, sin still carries real consequences.

In response to suffering, people often look for human solutions: stronger laws, better education, or more just systems. These are important, but they do not answer the deeper question: *If God is loving, why do bad things happen?*

Scripture gives us an answer rooted in spiritual conflict. God has an enemy—Satan—who was once an angel named Lucifer. After rebelling against God, he tempted Adam and Eve to sin. Since then, humanity has been born with a sinful nature that opposes God. Even believers, filled with the Holy Spirit, must wrestle daily against this brokenness.

But we are not without hope. Jesus Christ came into the world, died on the cross, and rose again to defeat sin, death, and the devil. His resurrection assures us that the enemy’s power will not last. Jesus will return. The world will be made new. Evil will not have the final word.

We grieve when bad things happen, but we do not lose heart. We know both the beginning and the end of the story—and we trust that God’s redemption is already at work. Jesus is coming again.

The Church Council did not meet this month because of the threatening weather conditions we had on the evening of their meeting. Although no Council business was conducted last month, our Pastor and Ministry Teams were busy and we have included their reports in this month's newsletter.

Pastor's Report ~ *Pastor Niveen Sarras*

1. Memorial Services:

- I have officiated memorial services for Jane Ellen Hartley and Walt Ziemke. These services were meaningful opportunities to remember and honor their lives, and to support their families during their times of loss.

2. Confirmation Class Outing:

- On April 26th, I took the confirmation class to Olive Garden for a fellowship meal. This provided a wonderful opportunity for the students to bond outside of class and deepen their engagement with their faith journey. I have been working closely with the confirmation class and their families to prepare for the Youth Affirmation of Baptism service on May 18th. It is both a joy and a privilege to guide these young people in their faith development, and I am truly blessed by their dedication and commitment.

3. Holy Communion at Cobblestone Assisted Living:

- I began providing Holy Communion services once a month at CopperStone Assisted Living in Neenah. This is an important ministry, and it has been a blessing to serve the residents there.

4. Meeting with Dawn and Laurie on April 28th:

- On April 28th, I met with Dawn and Laurie to discuss potential projects to present to a church donor, who is interested in sponsoring a project in the church.

5. Text Study with Colleagues:

- I attended a text study with my colleagues on April 29th at Christus Lutheran church in Greenville. This provided an excellent opportunity for mutual learning and sharing of insights.

6. Coaching Session for Minister:

7. Coaching Class Level 2:

- I have begun a Level 2 Coaching class, which consists of 8 sessions every Thursday from 10- 12 pm. The class will conclude by the end of June, and ELCA has generously covered the entire tuition.

8. Baptism Discussion with Rhonda and her family:

- On May 1st, I met with Rhonda and her family to discuss the significance of Amylah's baptism. This time of reflection and preparation for the sacrament was meaningful, and the baptism, celebrated on May 11th, was a joyful and beautiful expression of faith.

10. Catholic Meeting on May 8th:

- On May 8th, Pat Westphal and I met with the Pax Christi group at Casa Esther, a Catholic ministry in Omro. The purpose of the meeting was to connect with the group, share our experiences of ministering in challenging political environments, and discuss the situation of Palestinian Christians in Palestine.

Pine Ridge Reconciliation Center in South Dakota Update: Trip dates of June 30-July 4. There are 9 people going and one not confirmed. Received a \$2,100 A *Doing a New Thing* Grant grant application from the synod. Dawn has developed a handout with information such as what to expect, fundraising ideas to discuss, what to pack, etc. She will be setting up a date for the group to meet. At this point, they do not need our help with anything. Once we hear what date they set for a fry bread fundraiser, we could coordinate a carwash on that same day & gather youth to work it.

Fritse Park picnic on Sunday, June 8 from noon to 2:30 pm. It includes BIG yard games and a scavenger hunt.

Ginny & Laurie will visit the park to see if they have grills & coordinate the food. We will provide brats, hamburgers, chips, cookies, soda & water. Finance and Stewardship Ministry Team—May 13, 2025 ~ Submitted by Laurie Olson

Members Present: Treasurer Laurie Olson, Financial Secretary Pat Westphal, Mary Jane Hartley, and Jason Blank.

Members Absent: Pastor Niveen, Fern Fuhrmann, and Pennie Linna

Opened with a Prayer.

Reviewed current account balances through end of April 2025. April's giving to current monthly expenses was \$13,840.16 and expenses were \$13,216.34. The difference was \$623.82.

Year-to-date: Spending=\$55,284.13 and Giving=\$58,673.76 with a net of +\$3,389.63.

Total Associated Bank checking has a balance of \$236,608.54 which includes \$124,426.84 allocated to designated accounts and \$112,181.70 for current operating. Additionally, \$170,189.34 in the Thrivent money market and \$1,032.40 in Thrivent TIPS account and \$57,298.52 in the ELCA Mission Investment Fund.

Pat Westphal reported that she has three new volunteer members willing to become counters. Pat will review the current teams with Jean.

Laurie suggested that the Funeral Fund balance be transferred into the Hospitality Fund. It was noted that paper products for the kitchen are purchased out of the Hospitality Fund and funeral luncheons are welcome to use those products, as needed. The need for two separate accounts is no longer necessary. Laurie said she consulted with Pat Thompson, who is one of the individuals overseeing the Funeral Fund, and she agreed with the merging of the accounts. The balance in the Funeral Fund, as of end of April, was \$369.18 and the Hospitality Fund was \$1,546.39.

The team discussed the account that the new furnaces should be allocated towards. It was decided that the Building Improvement account is the appropriate account.

Laurie noted that the Bible Camper Fund has been depleted, after paying for three campers to attend camp this summer. There is at least one additional camper still interested in attending and on behalf of the Youth Ministry Team, an Endowment Grant was written to apply for funds to cover the camper fees. It was also noted that the Youth Ministry Team, in addition to Donna Joachim running the annual basket raffle, will monitor the Bible Camper Fund and seek additional funding sources (grants & fundraising) in the future.

Closed with the Lord's Prayer.

St. Mark's Helping Hands Fund

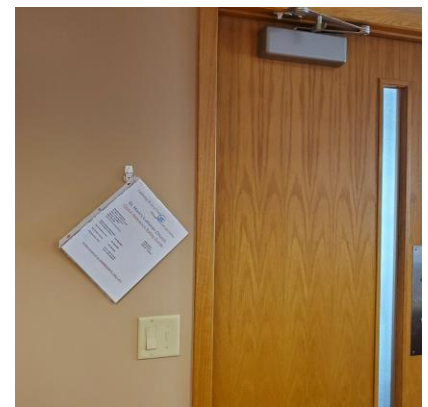
Our Mission of the month for June is our own Helping Hands Fund. The purpose of the Helping Hands Fund is to provide financial aid to an individual/family who is in need on an urgent basis. The Helping Hands Fund is available to all and is not limited to those attending St. Mark's. The Social Ministry Team, under the oversight of the Pastor, has responsibility for overseeing the fund. In the past, we have funded a rent payment for an individual who had just started a new job, but had not received their first paycheck, a partial mortgage payment for an individual who was at risk of losing their home, and a payment to a mechanic for a family who needed a car, but could not afford to get it repaired. The Helping Hands fund has also been used to help pay utility and medical bills for families in need.

Individuals or families seeking assistance from the Helping Hand Fund are asked to complete an application and submit supporting documentation, such as a utility or medical bill. Then the Social Ministry team meets to consider their application and if they approve the request, a check is sent to the utility company, medical complex, landlord, etc. to cover the money owed.

Currently, the Helping Hands fund is almost depleted, so it is perfect timing that it was on the Mission of the Month schedule for June. Please consider giving a donation to this much needed ministry of St. Mark's. Mark your giving envelope as a "Mission of the Month" donation or use your VANCO electronic giving to support our Helping Hands Ministry this month.

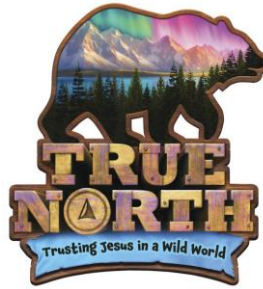
