Dear Children of God at Saint Mark's Lutheran Church,

Grace and peace to you from the risen Christ.

Do you know the reason why many Lutheran churches display an empty cross instead of a crucifix in their sanctuary?

Many Lutheran churches today do not display a crucifix—a cross bearing the image of Jesus—in their sanctuaries, often due to the mistaken belief that it is solely a Roman Catholic tradition. However, during Martin Luther's time, the crucifix was a common and meaningful part of Lutheran worship. Lutherans historically embraced it as a powerful symbol of Christ's sacrificial death, consistent with the Apostle Paul's message: "We proclaim Christ crucified" (1 Corinthians 1:23).

The preference for an empty cross over a crucifix in many Lutheran churches can be traced not to Lutheran theolog,y but to the influence of the Reformed tradition, which was more suspicious of religious imagery. Unlike the Reformed, Lutherans affirmed that art and images—when used appropriately—serve to deepen devotion and focus attention on the truths of Scripture.

The decline in crucifix use in some Lutheran contexts began with the rise of Pietism in the 17th century. Pietists, separating from Luther's teachings, distrusted symbols and turned away from many traditional Lutheran practices. Since many early Lutheran immigrants to the United States were pietists, this attitude shaped American Lutheranism, leading to a general wariness toward religious imagery.

Nevertheless, traditional Lutheran theology never rejected the use of religious art. Instead, it affirmed the proper, faithful use of symbols as part of Christian freedom and as a way to glorify God. Today, many Lutherans have returned to the original Lutheran tradition, using the crucifix as a powerful visual testament to the Gospel and Christ's redemptive work.

The difference was -\$2,503.32. It was reported that the second quarter insurance bill were paid. Additionally, the utility expenses were high, due to the extremely cold temperatures in February. With the temperatures warming and daylight increasing we will begin to see the WEnergies invoices drop extensively.

Year-to-date: Spending=\$42,067.79 and Giving=\$44,833.60 with a net of +\$2,765.81.

Total Associated Bank checking has a balance of \$243,705.22 which includes \$131,669.36 allocated to designated accounts and \$112,035.86 for current operating. Additionally, \$170,189.34 in the Thrivent money market and \$1,032.40 in Thrivent TIPS account and \$57,298.52 in the ELCA Mission Investment Fund.

Audit Ministry Team Report—March 22, 2025 ~ Submitted by Laurie Olson and Pat Westphal

The Audit Team met on March 22, 2025, and reviewed the records and the financial reports of St. Mark's Lutheran Church for the 2023 and 2024 church years. The review consisted of cash receipts, cash distributions, general financial controls, banking statement reconciliations, credit card use procedures, payroll, etc. The reviews did not find any significant errors, omissions, or control deficiencies and the financial reports are accurately stated.

The following findings and notes for future audits:

- 1. File VANCO (online giving system) monthly summaries on top for ease in matching.
- 2. On recording form, add a column for "reference number" (account number or invoice number)
- 3. Follow up with Fire & Safety Equipment company on a \$10 overpayment from 1/17/2023.
- 4. File monthly reconciled bank statements in the locked file cabinet.

Ministry Teams: Christian Education has not met yet. The youth are planning a few things for this summer to keep them connected and involved. JT recommended Fritze Park after a church service followed by food. We discussed sidewalk chalk art with pizza. They are also doing a mural on the west wall of the church. We also discussed the survey Jean had completed from last fall. Tammie discussed attaching a bulletin to the livestream for people who watch church at home. It would be good accessibility for those who aren't in person at church. Could this be available electronically and for those in person when it runs out in church. QR Code for the bulletin? Tammie said she liked a statement by an attendee: "We will focus on what is possible for the future, rather than how we have done things in the past." Other items mentioned:

More connection for our agenda as a church council-talked about having each member give a high & low about what's going on in the lives. Dawn will have this added to the agenda. Reviewed the checklist provided at the academy on job of the council? What could we apply to our church and what do we already do well?

New Business: Pastor Niveen brought up the ideal of doing the newsletter items in the bulletin once a week, instead of doing it once a month to help break down some work for Jean. Pastor proposes sending the last two Sundays to homebound church members, instead of doing a monthly newsletter. The weekly newsletter would have the information instead of putting it in the bulletin. Would trial basis work? Would this provide more time

A BOOK REVIEW



Thank you, Sherri Denney, for the donation to our library. <u>Little Hawk and the Lone Wolf</u>, A Memoir by Raymond C. Kaquatosh (Little Hawk).

Raymond was born in 1924 on the Menominee Reservation near Keshena, WI. He was the son of a medicine woman and began life as a boy steeped in tribal and family traditions in the natural world of Northern Wisconsin. After the death of his father at the time of the depression, he was sent to live at the Indian boarding school in Keshena. Without a means of transportation and due to the financial constraints, the 8-yr. old boy was unable to return home until later. He was a lonely boy when he met and befriended a lone wolf.

Through each chapter of his life, through school and work, time with the Marines, and finally postwar Wausau with his future wife, the wolf waited, and the friendship held. This is a rare book written in first-person by a Menominee Indian. It is by turns funny, sad, irreverent, and deeply moving.

The book has about a sixth grade reading level and would be enjoyed by youth as well as adults. It is a quick read and reveals many of the hurdles in life faced by a Wisconsin Indian boy and man. "Little Hawk" died in 2018 at the age of 93.
