

Pastor's Message

This October, as we celebrate the Reformation, we also mark a milestone that is both deeply personal and historically transformative: the 500th anniversary of the marriage of former monk **Martin Luther** and former nun **Katharina von Bora**, which took place on June 13, 1525.

Their marriage did not begin as a typical love story. Katharina, a former Cistercian nun, was one of nine women who famously escaped their convent in barrels of smelly herring, literally smuggled out to freedom. Luther had helped arrange homes and marriages for several of

these women, and at first, he had another suitor in mind for Katharina. But Katharina was determined and strong-willed. She rejected other proposals and made it clear that if she were to marry, it would be Martin. Luther eventually agreed, declaring, "Well then, I will do it: I will play the devil and the world this trick; I will content my father, and marry Katharina."

Their wedding was simple and private, attended by only a few witnesses. Because nuns and monks were expected to remain celibate, their union caused considerable uproar in the Church. Critics were scandalized, even claiming that a child born from the marriage of a former monk and nun would surely be the Antichrist.¹

Yet in quietly challenging centuries of clerical celibacy, their union **laid the foundation for a new vision of Protestant family life**, redefined Christian marriage, and shaped the understanding of the clergy's vocation. Their marriage humanized Luther, making him more relatable to ordinary believers, highlighted marriage as a sacred institution in the Reformation, inspired other reformers to marry, reshaped church practices, strengthened women's roles, and modeled a family life based on mutual respect and partnership.

- Sept. 30 Blessed to Be Bold: The Reformation, Power, and Women


 Dr. Mary Streufert explores the marriage of Martin Luther and Katharina von Bora and its connection to theological reformation and evolving understandings of gender and power.

In response, I prepared a survey—reviewed and approved by the Worship and Music Ministry Team—that will be distributed to the congregation on September 21. This will allow us to better understand needs and preferences for future worship opportunities.

Ministry Team Participation

- I also participated in the Christian Education Ministry Team meeting, helping prepare for the Sunday School year. I will be teaching children's classes on several Sundays, as well as leading Sunday morning Bible Study.
- Dawn Jones and I will continue co-leading the Adult Forum and Bible Study.

Teaching and Wider Church Involvement

• Starting on Friday, September 19, I will also be teaching **Old Testament once a month at the Lay School of the East-Central Synod**. This is a wonderful opportunity for me to share my expertise with students across our synod and to strengthen connections between St. Mark's and the wider church.

Upcoming Sermon Series

• With the consultation and approval of the Worship and Music Ministry Team, I prepared a stewardship-focused sermon series titled "One Body, Many Parts: Serving Together at St. Mark's" (1 Corinthians 12:12–27). This series will guide us in reflecting on our call to serve together as one body in Christ.

St. Mark's Lutheran Church Donation & Gift Policy Purpose

The purpose of this policy is to provide guidance for the acceptance, acknowledgment, use, and management of donations and gifts to St. Mark's Lutheran Church in support of our mission and ministries.

1. Types of Gifts Accepted

2. St. Mark's welcomes the following types of gifts:

- Monetary Gifts: Cash, checks, electronic donations, online giving, and recurring gifts.
- **Designated Gifts**: Contributions directed toward specific ministries, programs, or funds (e.g., Building Fund, Mission of the Month).
- Undesignated Gifts: Contributions to be used at the church's discretion in accordance with ministry priorities.
- **In-Kind Gifts**: Tangible property such as furniture, equipment, or supplies may be accepted based on current needs.
- Planned Gifts: Bequests, charitable trusts, life insurance policies, and other legacy gifts.

3. Acceptance of Gifts

- All donations are subject to review and approval by the Church Council or will send the donation review to the appropriate staff or ministry team.
- Gifts that come with restrictions, conditions, or require long-term commitments must be approved by the Church Council.
- The church reserves the right to decline gifts that are inconsistent with its mission, impractical to manage, or create liability.

- Designated gifts will be used for the specified purpose whenever possible. If that purpose is no longer viable, the Church Council may redirect funds in a manner as close as possible to the donor's original intent.
- Undesignated gifts will be allocated at the discretion of church leadership in alignment with ministry priorities.

5. Naming Plates

- Donors may request a nameplate in recognition of a significant gift or in-kind donation (e.g., furniture, equipment, memorial items).
- The cost of the nameplate and installation must be covered by the donor.
- Nameplate wording and placement must be approved by the Church Council to ensure consistency with the values, tone, and aesthetics of the church.
- The church reserves the right to remove or relocate nameplates in the future if needed due to renovations, repurposing of space, or other church decisions.

6. Acknowledgment & Documentation

- Donors will receive a written acknowledgment for all contributions in accordance with IRS quidelines.
- The church will not assign monetary value to non-cash or in-kind gifts for tax purposes but will acknowledge the nature of the gift received.
- Donors are encouraged to consult their tax advisors for charitable deduction eligibility.

7. Confidentiality

• All donor information will be kept confidential unless express permission is given for public recognition.

8. Ethical Stewardship

• The church is committed to transparency and faithful stewardship of all gifts. Financial reports will be made available to the congregation annually or upon request.

9. Policy Review

This policy shall be reviewed periodically and updated as needed by the Church Council.

Additionally, \$171,911.13 in the Thrivent money market and \$1,048.42 in Thrivent TIPS account and \$57,298.52 in the ELCA Mission Investment Fund.






