Fasting: God's Ancient Gift for the Healing of Humanity

Pastor's Post

As we enter the season of Lent, the Church invites us to slow down and turn our hearts back to God. In these forty days, through prayer, repentance, and fasting, we walk with Christ into the wilderness so that we may be healed, renewed, and prepared to rejoice in the resurrection at Easter. I would like to explain the meaning of fasting according to Scripture.

Fasting by giving up a favorite food is a relatively modern practice that developed as a devotional substitute when full fasting became difficult. While it can still be meaningful when joined with prayer and repentance, it is not how fasting is defined in Scripture or practiced in the early Church.

Fasting is neither a later spiritual invention nor merely a discipline of religious communities. It is the oldest commandment given to humanity, rooted in God's original relationship with humankind. In the Garden of Eden, God granted Adam the freedom to enjoy creation's abundance, yet lovingly set a boundary: he was to refrain from eating from one specific tree (Genesis 2:16-17).

The forbidden tree was "good for food... a delight to the eyes... and desirable" (Genesis 3:6), yet Adam was called to abstain. Fasting, therefore, was humanity's first invitation to rise above bodily impulses and allow the spirit to lead. Had humanity passed this test, the soul would have triumphed over the flesh, opening the way to the tree of life. Instead, surrender to appetite led to spiritual collapse, and the body gained mastery over the soul. From that moment on, humanity struggled with sins of the flesh and learned what it meant to live "according to the flesh" rather than the Spirit (cf. Romans 8).

Into this broken story came Jesus Christ—not to abolish fasting, but to restore it to its redemptive purpose. Because the first fall came through eating, Christ began His victory through fasting. Before preaching, healing, or gathering disciples, He fasted. When tempted to turn stones into bread, He revealed a

profound truth: “One shall not live by bread alone, but by every word that comes from the mouth of God” (Matthew 4:4). Physical nourishment alone cannot sustain the soul. Through Christ, fasting becomes a path of restoration, reordering the human person by placing the spirit above the body. Hunger can be holy, and emptiness can become space for God.

Biblical fasting involves abstaining from food altogether for a set period. The people of God refrained completely from eating until a specific hour, experiencing true hunger, and then broke their fast with simple, modest food. Fasting was a genuine bodily participation in prayer and repentance, not merely symbolic.

Throughout Scripture, fasting appears as a response to sorrow, repentance, intercession, and longing for God. King David humbled himself: *“I humbled my soul with fasting”* (Psalm 35:13). For him, fasting was inward surrender, not outward performance. The prophets followed the same path. Daniel fasted while seeking understanding and mercy for his people. Ezekiel fasted as part of his prophetic witness. Anna the prophetess spent her life in the temple, *“worshiping with fasting and prayer night and day”* (Luke 2:37), showing that fasting can be a lifelong posture of devotion, not merely a temporary discipline.

In the New Testament, fasting moves from preparation into mission. Jesus declared that after His departure, His disciples would fast (Matthew 9:15). They did, not out of obligation, but because fasting sharpened spiritual vision and attuned their hearts to the Holy Spirit. During a time of fasting and worship, the Spirit spoke clearly: *“Set apart for me Barnabas and Saul”* (Acts 13:2). The Church’s first missionary movement was born not in strategy meetings, but in fasting and prayer.

Fasting also becomes the context for divine revelation. While Peter fasted, God opened his heart to the Gentiles (Acts 10). While Paul fasted, he endured hardship with spiritual strength and clarity (Acts 9:9; 2 Corinthians 6:5). Jesus Himself taught that some spiritual battles require more than words: *“This kind does not go out except by prayer and fasting”* (Matthew 17:21). Fasting is not weakness—it is spiritual authority exercised through humility.

Fasting is deeply communal as well as individual. Just as believers pray together *“with one accord”* (Acts 4:24), they also fast together. When the people of Israel faced danger during Queen Esther’s time, the nation fasted in unity, and God delivered them. The same pattern appears with Ezra, Nehemiah, Jehoshaphat, and the prophets: when the people fasted together, God acted.



Fasting calls for intention and discernment, and I encourage you to approach it thoughtfully and prayerfully. Set a clear and realistic time for your fast, and let that time be accompanied by prayer, meditation on Scripture, and sincere repentance of heart. Remember, it is not the length of the fast that matters most, but the spirit in which it is offered. If you are new to fasting, long hours may feel overwhelming at first—and that is okay. I invite you to begin gently by committing a few hours to God, and then, as your strength and discipline grow, to extend that time little by little. Fasting helps train the will, discipline the body, and deepen our dependence on God rather than on comfort or habit.

For those who have health concerns or must take medication, fasting should be adapted with wisdom and care. In such cases, fasting is not set aside but practiced in a way that is safe and faithful, within the limits of your body. For instance, you may want to fast after taking your medication.

Fasting is not merely a command but a gift from God, meant to heal, guide, and deepen our spiritual life. When practiced with intention, it strengthens prayer, sharpens the mind, lightens the body, and draws us closer to God. Fasting lies at the heart of Christian life—ancient, biblical, communal, and life-giving—offering a path to freedom, humility, and the restoration of our true calling in Christ. In this Lenten season, let us embrace fasting not as a burden, but as a sacred gift: a way to humble ourselves, to listen more attentively to God, and to prepare our hearts for the joy of Easter.

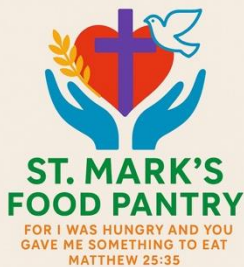

Did You Know? Jean Memken-February. Dawn will do March with a history of the Movie Room, including a picture. It was suggested to ask Donna to consider writing something for October or November on the Basket Raffle.

Financial Reports: Laurie reviewed current account balances through end of December 2025. December's giving to current monthly expenses was \$19,154.78 and expenses of \$33,182.29. The difference was -\$14,027.51. This monthly deficit was due to receiving/paying three invoices from the synod for Pastor Niveen's salary/benefits.

Year-to-date: Spending=\$186,721.59 and Giving=\$184,012.14 with a net of -\$2,709.45. Laurie said that these end-of-year numbers do not include all the giving to missions and other needs outside of St. Mark's. Those numbers will be prepared for the annual meeting.

Total Associated Bank checking has a balance of \$240,434.41 which includes \$146,747.46 allocated to designated accounts and \$93,686.95 for current operating. Additionally, \$175,308.72 in the Thrivent money market and \$1,057.56 in Thrivent TIPS account and \$58,647.98 in the ELCA Mission Investment Fund. Laurie noted that the Stewardship & Finance Team agreed to roll over the ELCA Mission Investment Fund for another three years at a fixed 4.2%. Stewardship & Finance Team will discuss, at their February meeting, changing some of the Thrivent Mutual Funds dollars into something a bit more aggressive, yet still on the conservative side.

This difference was due to receiving and paying three months of Pastoral salary/benefits to the synod in the month of December.

Year-to-date: Spending=\$186,721.59 and Giving=\$184,012.14 with a net of -\$2,709.45. This is end of the year balance of current spending.

Total Associated Bank checking has a balance of \$240,434.41 which includes \$146,747.46 allocated to designated accounts and \$93,686.95 for current operating. Additionally, \$175,308.72 in the Thrivent money market and \$1,057.56 in Thrivent TIPS account and \$58,647.98 in the ELCA Mission Investment Fund.

It was noted that the team met on Sunday, January 4 to discuss the Mission Investment Fund. The 3-year term was up. It was decided to rollover the funds for another three years at 4.1%.

Discussed briefly the need to stay on top of incoming giving – we have started the year with low giving the first two weeks of January. Pat noted that pledges are down significantly, but it was noted by Pennie that we did not focus on pledges, during our Stewardship Drive – it was spiritual gifts. Pastor Niveen remarked that many do not pledge, including herself.

Laurie and Pat have been working on compiling the end-of-year finances and reports.

The Finance Team reviewed the proposed 2026 budget, including benevolences. The team has recommended to the church council to maintain 2025 benevolence budget numbers.

The Mission of the Month for February is the Pine Ridge Reconciliation Center which is part of the Lutheran Lakota Shared Ministries. They focus on four different ministry outreach areas.

The Threshold/Common Basket ministry includes everything that is distributed out their door including new quilts and blankets, diapers and wipes, morning coffee, mid-day sandwiches, hot meals, and hygiene kits. In the winter months, it also includes our energy assistance matching program.



Cultural immersions are visiting groups who come to learn about Lakota history and culture from the Lakota people. We strive to provide programming and presentations that foster mutual conversations and greater understanding of each other.

The Lutheran/Lakota Job Corp employs local people from the community of Pine Ridge to run and assist the ministries of the Reconciliation Center. This ministry provides people with a way to earn a living and support their families. They have added a mentoring element to the program for young adults.

Children and Youth—Currently, the Pine Ridge Reconciliation Center hosts a variety of youth programs for young children, preteens and teens.

Last year, the Church Council asked me to write an article about our Endowment Fund for this column. I wrote about the history of the fund and how contributions to the Endowment Fund are kept as part of the principal of that account which allows the fund to accrue more interest. So, a gift to the Endowment Fund is a gift that will continue to keep on giving as it creates more revenue to fund applications to the account.

But what exactly does the Endowment Fund support? Well, lots of things. But it could fund so much more. In the past few years, the Endowment Fund has supported individuals in our church who wanted to attend Lay School by paying their tuition and purchasing their textbooks. It has also been used to pay registrations for women attending WELCA events. It purchased enough tickets to the ESTHER Banquet so ten of our members could attend and represent our church at that event. So, think about what kind of conferences, meetings, or educational opportunities you might like to attend and write an Endowment Grant to ask for support to attend those meetings. I know some of our members are interested in attending the WELCA national convention that is being held in Des Moines this year. Could an Endowment Fund grant help pay for that opportunity? Fill out an application and see!

Last year, an Endowment Grant funded some children to attend camp when the Bible Campers fund was depleted. If you know a child that wants to attend camp or an ELCA youth gathering, an Endowment Grant might help that child attend those events. Likewise, if you see an opportunity to attend an enriching experience yourself that will strengthen your faith and bring you into a closer relationship with our Lord, apply for a grant to help defray the cost of that opportunity.

The Endowment Fund is not just for our members, and for the past several years, we have funded another ELCA church's Advent worship activities, and we have sponsored one of the summer concerts at Linwood House. I am thrilled we can support other churches and organizations, but I would like to see the fund used primarily for our own members. So, think about your ministry here at St. Mark's and how the Endowment Fund might help you carry that out. Do you need materials to finish a project, food to offer at an educational event, books or Bible study materials? Those are appropriate uses of our Endowment Fund. It could also be used to purchase new music, Sunday School materials, or reimburse travel to a conference that relates to your ministry team or the service you do here at St. Mark's. 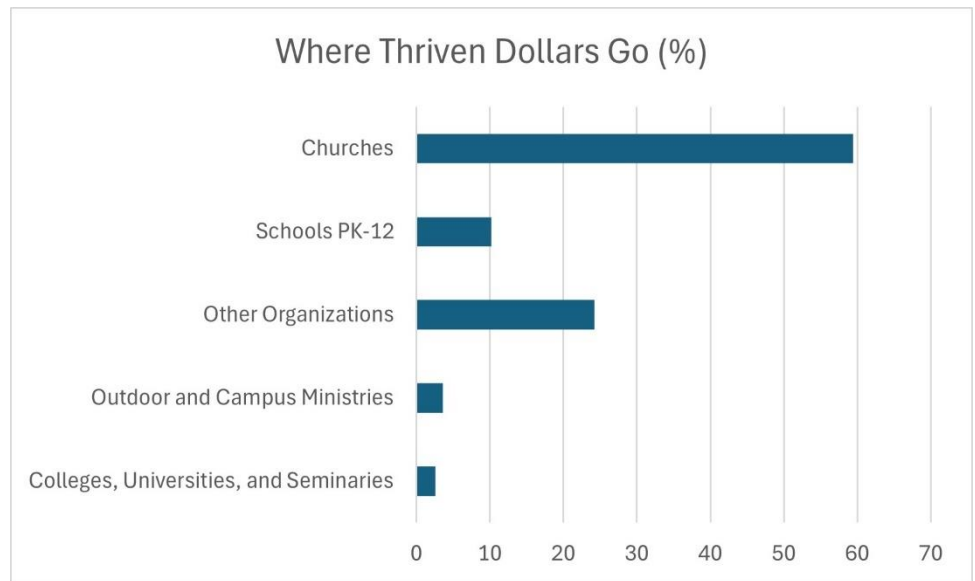
On the other hand, how about this one: "You are altogether beautiful, my love; there is no flaw in you" (4:7).
